COURAGE

THE SECRET. Courage is the secret of freedom. It is not new. Like many ideas, it may elude us if we fail to extract the great power it potentializes.

Thucydides knew that courage was the key to preserving freedom. He wrote: "The secret of happiness is freedom, and the secret of freedom, courage." Several years ago Archibald Mac Leish, discoursing on American aims, closely related freedom to courage and quoted Thucydides to support his logic. MacLeish wrote, "Freedom is never an accomplished fact. It is always a process. Which is why the drafters of the Declaration spoke of the pursuit of happiness: thev knew their Thucydides....

In Profiles in Courage, the late John F Kennedy's book, courage is said to be a diamond with many facets, owing much to its setting.

* * *

PLANNING. "In whatever arena of life one may meet the challenge of courage, whatever may be the sacrifices he faces, if he follows his conscience --- the loss of his friends, his fortune, his contentment, even the esteem of his fellow men--each man must decide for himself the course he will follow." That is what Mr. Kennedy wrote to point up the kinship of courage with con-science and conviction.

In discussions of moral courage, former Commandant General David M. Shoup stressed the essentiality of conviction. He said, "Moral courage--the courage of our convictions, the guts to stand up and be counted when a matter of principle is involved -is what it took, in combination with physical courage, to create these free and United States. And courage is what it will require in even greater measure to face the future and maintain our freedom." General Shoup agrees General Shoup agrees with Thucydides that the secret of freedom is courage.

(An AFNS Feature)

A notary public is a public official who is given a commission by a state to perform certain official acts within the state. The official acts allowed by most states are -- the power to take acknowledgments and affidavits, to administer oaths and to certify to the authenticity of documents.

A notary certifies that a signature on a document is genuine. This requires that the notary see the signature being made, Notaries are bonded to require compliance with the law.

Many legal assistance offices have a notary public as an employee. They perform their services without charge to servicemen and their families.

Further, nearly all states allow a commissioned officer to act as a notary for military personnel under certain conditions.

Contact your Legal Assistance Officer when you need to have a document notarized.

RESERVED PARKING SPACES AUTHORIZED

New parking spaces have been constructed in the O & T and Base Supply areas. Parking on the black top is now prohibited from the Base Supply Office to Beulah Road.

Previous parking spaces across from the 0 & T and Base Supply Buildings have been moved back off the black top and are all $\underline{\text{RE-SERVED}}$.

The new parking lot to the rear of the 0 & T Building contains 10 spaces each for Food Service and Dispensary personnel. Food Service will park on the west side and the Dispensary will utilize the east side of the lot.

Reserved parking spaces were limited to Commanders, First Sergeants and Section Chiefs.

Personnel not assigned a reserved parking space must park in approved parking lots or off base. There will be NO parking on the grass or within another person's reserved parking space. Violators will lose their base stickers.
