VIRGINIAN IS MENTIONED IN ANG OUTSTANDING AIRMAN COMPETITION

It was announced in the National Guard Bureau Bulletin of 26 January 1968 that Chief Master Sergeant Thomas W. Anthony of the 113th Tactical Fighter Group, District of Columbia Air National Guard, had won in the 1968 ANG Outstanding Airman competition.

Five other men, one from Iowa, one from Colorado, one from Utah, and two from the Oklahoma Air National Guard, received honorable mention in the competition.

Twenty-five competitors were mentioned by the Air National Guard Awards Board as being exceptionally well-qualified Air National Guardsmen. Among them is Chief Master Sergeant Francis C. Stonnel of the Virginia Air National Guard.

APPROPRIATE DUTY RULES CHANGED

In order to simplify the new pay procedures, the time limitations for Appropriate Duty have been changed for members of the 192d TFG. (See 192TFG Reg 11-1, 1 Feb 1968).

With the permission of your Squadron Commander, Appropriate Duty may be allowed up to 15 days before and up to 30 days after providing it is made during the

camp. However, if you have failed a Specialty Knowledge Test (SKT) since field training 1967 (even if you have qualified on a second SKT), you may not drive (or ride) to and from Annual Field Training by private transportation. Whether or not you have failed the SKT, all personnel must complete the enclosed form and return it to your Squadron Commander not later than 10 March 1968. If your request is not approved by this date you will travel by military transportation.

Transportation by privately owned conveyance (TPC) will be "at no expense to the Government" and performed on your own time. The Government can assume no responsibility in the event of an accident.

"INCREASED" SOCIAL SECURITY PAYCHECK DEDUCTIONS

Social Security paycheck deductions have been increased for military personnel and all other Americans under the system by legislation signed into law shortly after New Year's Day by President Johnson.

The President pointed out these increases will increase Social Security benefits by at least 13% for about 24 million Americans beginning in March.

While Social Security paycheck deductions remain at 4.4%, the old \$6,600 annual salary maximum from which deductions are taken has been raised to \$7,800. This means that the maximum possible total deduction is increased from 1967's \$294 to \$343.20.

Specific benefits stressed by the President in signing the legislation were:

Maximum benefits for a retired couple will rise from \$207 to \$234 and ultimately to \$323 a month.

Minimum benefits for an individual will be increased from \$44 to \$55 a month.

Outside earnings can total \$140 a month with no reduction in benefits.

A new Alert Plan, dated 1 March 1968, has been published and your copy was forwarded with this Vanguard. All previous alert plans are obsolete and should be destroyed.

Every member should check his address and phone number and notify all concerned if incorrect.

Every primary should contact all personnel for whom he is responsible and notify all concerned of necessary changes.

GATES

Every Saturday and on Sunday of drill weekends, VaANG gates will open at 0530 hours. They will open at 0700 hours Monday through Friday. Gates close every day at 1800 hours except for night flying when the main gate stays open until flying ends. The Beulah Road gate will stay closed.

The appearance of the Form W-2 with recent paychecks is a reminder that Federal income tax returns are due April 15.

"Your Federal Income Tax," the familiar, large paperback publication issued by the Government Printing Office each year, is a-

gain available.

The Internal Revenue publication explains Federal income tax laws as they apply to individuals and contains detailed instructions for submitting 1967 returns, due before April 15.

It defines what income is taxable and, equally important, what items may be deducted. It can be ordered from the Superintendent of Documents, U. S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402. Copies are 50 cents each; ask for Internal Revenue Service publication No. 17.

But the Federal Government is not the only authority that collects income taxes. Many states also collect on income, although some collect on special types of income only. There also are some cities that collect income taxes.

Members of the armed forces are generally not exempt from payment of income taxes imposed by the states of which they are legal residents. However, the law of the state of which the serviceman is a legal resident may exempt him from tax or it may exclude a major portion of his military pay from taxable income.

It is important to be knowledgeable about all income tax obligations. Failure to file returns and pay tax as it becomes due each year can result in having to pay taxes due for many years past--plus penalties and interest. Though tax rates of most states are generally low, compared to Federal tax rates, the bill can become quite steep if allowed to pile up.

Base Legal Assistance Offices have full information on this situation.

At the inauguration exercises of the Municipal Council of Gloucester, Mass., on January 3, 1916, the following prayer was delivered by the Rev. Levi M. Powers, D. D. As reported that day in the Gloucester Daily Times, some of those present "sat as if stunned. Some were plainly shocked while others smiled . . . and there was a noticeable tendency . . . to applaud at the close." Rev. Powers' prayer is quoted here in part (courtesy Mrs Stuart Moore of Ashland).

Almighty Father, the love of our city calls us here this morning. We begin today a new year of civic life. We know it is useless to ask thy blessing unless we want it and are anxious for it. No matter how much you may want to bless this city, you cannot do it unless the citizens are willing to be blest. We pray therefore first of all for the voters of this city. There are some too lazy to vote but not too lazy to grumble. Bless them. We pray for the tax payers who want good streets, good schools, good fire and police protection and good health officers but who wish other people to pay for their cost.

We pray for the business men whose votes are always determined by the expection of special favors for themselves. Bless them if you can. We pray for those who believe that all laws should be enforced except the laws which they do not like or which if enforced would trouble them. We pray for the comfortable who do not care about any thing so long as they are left at ease. We pray for political managers who swap votes and sell out their friends and let bad candidates go unopposed. We pray for those who vote for the saloons simply because they have property that rents for more for that than for any other purpose. We pray for ministers if there are any in this city--I do not believe there are--who say what is pleasant to hear rather than what is true. We pray for all connected with newspapers who openly advocate civic righteousness and secretly promote crooked politics.

We wish, 0 God, that all these people might be blessed, but perhaps we are asking too much, for we know that even you cannot bless them unless they mend their ways. It may be that the only thing you can do is to let them go to hell where they belong.

HELPING HAND REPORT: oral report of an incident affecting aerospace operational resources where sabotage cannot be ruled out immediately.

b. COVERED WAGON REPORT: An oral report of an incident affecting aerospace operational resources where sabotage is probable, definite or the incident is too serious to investigate.

c. SAFE WIND: A USAF directed expanded security posture, identical in all respects to TAC Security Condition 3.

d. SECURITY CONDITIONS OF READINESS:

(1) Security Condition Normal Security Posture

(2) Security Condition Alarm Investigation

(3) Security Condition Preventive Security Posture

(4) Security Condition Optimum Security Posture

(5) Security Condition Local Ground Attack

EDITORIAL

It's Your Responsibility

The time of the year has again arrived for us all to I face the spectre of one of life's two unavoidable situations — taxes. At least, that's what the old cliche

Everyone has received his W-2 forms and, after the Everyone has received his W-2 forms and, after the initial shock of seeing how much we really made during 1967 wears off and we have convinced ourselves that we really do have our correct withholding statement (not the one that shows the income of the commanding general or the department head), it's time to start gathering the necessary dats to compute our income tax return. Of course, in the process we try to determine where it all went and why we don't have more to show in the way of savings or other assets.

However, the moment of truth has arrived — it's time to compile figures and actually compute exemptions, deductions, credits,



etc. Although we have a highly complex tax law, the government has made every attempt to make your income tax computation as easy as possible.

When you compute your tax or, if necessary, have someone else do it, remember this: the government does not want you to pay more than your fair share of taxes. If you are in doubt about a deduction to claim, consuit your legal officer or other tax expert, don't simply ignore it with the idea, "It wouldn't be accepted any-way." If you are legally entitled to a deduction, the government wants you to take it.

On the other hand, don't try and be "slick." The IRS takes vigorous action against those people who attempt to shirk their responsibility and shift their individual tax burden to other conscientious taxpayers.



Our self-assessment tax system is a model for the rest of the world and depends on the honesty and integrity of the individual taxpayer. It is also equipped with built-in safeguards to protect the individual in case of missteps, differences and honest errors. Your annual federal income tax is one of the responsibilities that comes with the rights of citizenship. All that is expected is that you meet this responsibility honestly, accurately and by April 15. (APPR)



A SMOKER'S DILEMMA

(The following report by MSgt. Charles Wilkson, Hamilton AFB, Calif., appears to have a wide appeal)

There is no more pitiful sight in the world than an ex-smoker of one day trying to make it an even two.

People start smoking for many reasons, but they usually stop for only one--fear.

Between the taste you wake up with and the early morning coughing performance, you get the idea that your body is trying to tell you to knock it off.

There are two ways of trying to stop. One is to go "cold turkey," throw away all your matches, cigarettes, cigars and tobacco and sweat it out in virtue. The other way is to taper off and prolong the agony.

The antics would-be ex-smokers go through are amazing to watch. The "taper off" types usually decide that they will only smoke at certain times. They spend all their time clock-watching to see how soon they can light up again. They smoke their cigarette or cigar down to the last shred of to-bacco, risking third-degree burns in the process.

Pipe smokers are just as bad. They keep trying to light the burned out cinders in the bowl of their pipe under the pretense that it went out prematurely.

The "cold turkey" ex-smokers suffer in other ways. They are prone to glazed eyes and sudden fits of throwing windows open followed by deep breathing. They also spend a lot of time fumbling around, trying to find something to do with their hands, now that they have nothing to hold.

THREE ANG MILITARY AIRLIFT UNITS
ARE TO CONVERT TO C-124's

Three Air National Guard Military Airlift Groups will convert from C-97 to C-124 type aircraft during the fourth quarter of FY 1968. Involved in the conversion are the 157th MAGp, New Hampshire ANG and the 137th and 138th MAGps of the Oklahoma ANG.

Six ANG units have already converted to C-124 type aircraft.

ANG AIRCRAFT FLY TAC COURIER SERVICE

Four units of the Air National Guard began flying the Tactical Air Command's weekly East/West Courier Service on February 5, 1968. C-121 and C-97 type aircraft are being used to support this mission.

Flights operate every Monday through Thursday. They originate at Langley AFB, Virginia, and fly to James Connally AFB and Nellis AFB, and return fia the same route.

The 171st Military Airlift Wing, Greater Pittsburgh Airport, Coraopolis, Pennsylvania, and the 193rd Tactical Electronic Warfare Group have been designated to provide the necessary support. The C-121 and C-97 aircraft, which are configured for maximum passenger seating, are assigned to the following units:

171st MAGp, Greater Pittsburgh Airport, Coraopolis, Penna; 167th MAGp, Martinsburg MAP, Martinsburg, West Virginia; 111th MAGp, Willow Grove NAS, Willow Grove, Pennsylvania; 193rd TEWg, Olmsted MAP, Middletown, Pennsylvania.

The mission is being performed at the request of Tactical Air Command.
