FEDERAL INSPECTION THIS WEEK END

GENERAL INSPECTION

26-29 MARCH 1971

As directed by Tactical Air Command, the Inspector General, Ninth Air Force, will conduct a unit effectiveness inspection of the 192d Tactical Fighter Group during the period 26-29 March 1971.

The inspection team, consisting of 18 officers and 13 NCOs, will arrive by military aircraft approximately 0930 hours on 26 March 71.

Attendance is mandatory for all personnel 27 and 28 March 1971.

An In-ranks Inspection will be held Sunday morning, 28 March 1971, at 0730 hours, REPEAT 0730 hours, on the Aircraft Ramp. Uniform for the inspection will be the Blue Uniform with Visor Cap. Shoes must be shined to a high gloss and haircuts should be military and not over three (3) days old. Name plates and/or sun glasses will NOT be worn during the inspection. LOOK SHARP!

192D COMMUNICATIONS FLIGHT

The Annual Federal Inspection of the 192d Communications Flight (Support) has been rescheduled to 26-28 Mar 71. Attendance at drill 27-28 March is mandatory.

UNION WINS EXCLUSIVE

The Association of Civilian Technicians, Old Dominion Chapter, won the exclusive right to represent members of the Virginia Air National Guard in Labor-Management Relations at an election held here at Byrd Field on 17 March 1971.

A petition by the National Association of Government Employees (NAGE) was defeated.

TB SKIN TESTS

Tuberculin skin tests are now required with all periodic physical examinations, except for those persons who already have a positive tuberculin skin test. Tests have already been administered to some Air Technicians prior to the unit training assembly. The tests will become a regular feature during all future unit training assemblies.

NGAUS SUGGESTS EXTENSION OF DRAFT LAW TO SENATE

WASHINGTON, DC (NGAUS) -- In its first appearance before a Congressional Committee of the 92nd Congress, the National Guard Association recommended continuance of the draft.

Testifying before the Senate Armed Services Committee February 11, Colonel James B. Deerin, NGAUS Executive Vice President, cited the increasing importance of the National Guard Total Force planning. He explained that, "the draft must be continued if the Active Force, National Guard and other Reserve Forces are to be maintained at authorized strength levels."

He said, "The National Guard Association of the United States takes a position that the Congress should support all reasonable efforts by the Administration to meet its objectives of obtaining manpower on a volunteer basis. But we also feel that we must be realistic about the success of such an effort and certainly not throw away a system which we know works until the volunteer concept has proved feasible."

"If we are to continue to spend considerable sums on Reserve Forces, including the National Guard, we must be assured that these elements of our defense forces are at acceptable levels of mobilization readiness. Adequate strength is an element of readiness. While we may find merit in the concept of volunteer forces, our experience leads us to believe that in this era, we will continue to need a military draft to sustain Active and Reserve Forces' strength levels."

"We in the National Guard have always looked with pride on the voluntary nature of our organization. Although our personnel procurement has been influenced by many factors, the fact remains that an individual must volunteer to become a member of a National Guard unit. There is no question that in recent years the influence of the draft law has been rather significant in meeting our strength levels."

ANG DEVELOPS QUICK REACTION FORCE FOR RIOT CONTROL

The Air National Guard is organizing 200-man Civil Disturbance "Quick Reaction" forces at most of its 87 bases, according to information received from the National Guard Bureau.

Under plans being developed, the Security Technicians from every ANG base will attend a Civil Disturbance course and return to their home bases and conduct classes.

Funds are being made available to purchase armor, face shields and riot batons. Additional drills, depending upon trained personnel, may vary from two to as many as eight. All ANG bases will have a minimum 35-man base security team.

Brigadier General John J. Pesch, ANG director, told state Adjutants General recently, that "Along with all of our training for the wartime mission, we must not overlook or under-emphasize Civil Disturbances. The beefed-up base security force is something we have needed for a long time."

In Fiscal Year 1970, 88,772 Guardsmen were ordered to duty on 184 occasions for: 60,316 on 92 occasions for civil disorders in 31 states; and 28,406 Guardsmen for 92 natural disasters or other emergencies in 27 states.

SAFETY AWARDS PROGRAM

The Safety Awards Program has been reactivated. The 192d Tactical Fighter Group will present a \$25.00 Savings Bond quarterly to the person who makes the best safety suggestion.

The purpose of the Safety Awards Program is to encourage an increased awareness of safety.

Recommendations will be judged by the Base Safety Council and the Office of Safety.

Sectional supervisors must have submitted their recommendations for the best suggestion by the end of the last UTA of each quarter (March, June, September and December).

Frequently the question arises as to who may claim an individual as a dependent when he is supported by multiple taxpayers.

The law provides that an individual who is receiving support from two or more persons, none of whom furnishes more than half, may, nevertheless, be claimed as a dependent of a taxpayer who furnished more than 10 percent of his support, if:

The taxpayer would qualify for the exemption anyway had he furnished more than half his support; all other persons in like status who furnished more than 10 percent of his support will file a declaration that they will not claim the exemption (these declarations to be filed with the return of the taxpayer claiming the exemption); and more than half of the individual's support was furnished by a group of persons, each of whom would qualify for the exemption if he had furnished more than half of the support.

The taxpayer claiming exemption for a dependent by reason of multiple support should obtain Form 2120 from each of the other persons qualified but not claiming the dependent. This should be attached to the income tax return. The taxpayer also should be prepared to furnish names of all contributors and other pertinent information.

Agents Sought For Narcotic, Drug Bureau

WASHINGTON (AFPS) — Applications are being accepted by the U.S. Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs for positions of special agent, the Justice Department has announced. Selectees will participate in a formal, ten-week course at the National Training Institute in Washington, D.C. Instruction will cover self-defense, use of firearms, narcotic and drug abuse laws, court procedures, investigative techniques, criminology, drug and narcotic identification. Lowest positions, the announcement said, begin at GS-7 —\$10,727 yearly, including overtime. Qualification requirements include established eligibility on a Federal Entrance Examination plus one year of graduate study or one year of experience. Some positions start

at a GS-9 level for qualified applicants, the announcement added. Other requirements are: applicants must be male, possess American citizenship, have a valid driver's license, be able to undergo a background investigation, and pass a rigid physical examination. Rapid promotional opportunities exist, officials said, to Grades GS-11 and GS-12, dependent upon satisfactory job performance and a minimum of one year of experience in a federal law enforcement officer positions should contact the nearest Regional Office of the U.S. Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs or write to the Bureau's Headquarters, Washington, D.C. 20537.

DOD OUTLINES POLICY ON PW/MIA FOR COMMANDERS

In line with the continuing and mounting national concern over the plight of U. S. servicemen captured and missing in action in Southeast Asia, the Department of Defense recently provided this guidance: Petitions on the PW/MIA issue may be circulated on military installations if deemed appropriate by the installation commander. A military man may express his opinion to a foreign government on the PW/MIA issue and use his military rank or title. Individuals should restrict the content of letters to the issues of humane treatment and release of PW's by the enemy and compliance with other provisions of the Geneva Convention of 1949 - and avoid political comment. Commanders are advised that some Vietnamese translations being circulated as letters and petitions in the American PW/MIA issue have been found to be in good taste and suitable for use. Others, however, have been reported to contain insulting words, phrases, and obscenities.

Persons signing letters and petitions addressing the plight of American PW/MIA's in SEA are urged to sign an English text only. Unless the individual has personal knowledge that a translation is appropriate and contains nothing that would destroy any value the letter might have as an expression of concern by individual American citizens, signing Vietnamese text is not recommended.

ANG PARTICIPATION IN WEAPONS MEET TO BE TELECAST

The American Broadcasting Company's "Wide World of Sports" television program will feature the 1970 William Tell Interceptor Weapons Meet on a nationwide telecast on Saturday afternoon, 20 Mar 1971. Personnel from ANG Fighter Groups turned in an outstanding performance in competition with USAF and Canadian Armed Forces at the 1970 William Tell Meet last fall at Tyn dall AFB. It is anticipated that Guard participation in this Air Defense Command biennial competition will be a highlight of the "Wide World of Sports" presentation filmed on the scene by an ABC crew.

Lightning

A Shocking Handicap

It's about that time of year again when grown men, armed with a variety of weapon-like clubs, pit their wits against a tiny white ball. Although defenseless and unable to strike back, the ball frequently is the victor. Some golfers this year could lose, not only a match, but also their lives. Did you know that lightning kills up to 500 U.S. golfers a year? Last year in one city three golfers had just taken refuge under a tree when lightning struck. One was merely stunned, but two were knocked unconscious. Fortunately, a Red Cross nurse and her hus-



band were near the scene of the accident and immediately gave mouth-to-mouth resuscitation to the stricken men. Their lives were saved, but only because of the couple's quick thinking and knowledge of how to give this form of artificial respiration. Lightning will strike the highest point in an area, and on a wide-open golf course, a golfer might be the highest point. However, the majority of victims are not felled from the bolt itself but from side flashes or ground charges. Immediate action can mean the difference between life and death. The reason for giving mouth-to-mouth resuscitation is that an electrical shock interrupts breathing because it affects nerves and muscles. The next time you're on a golf course during an electrical storm, remember these simple Red Cross rules: 1. Don't raise an umbrella. 2. Avoid small sheds and shelters in an exposed area. 3. Don't stand under an isolated tree or small clump of trees. 4. Seek shelter in dense woods, a frame building protected against lightning, or any natural protection. To continue to play while lightning crackles around you, could net you a lot worse than a seven-stroke hole. (AFPS)

GUARD UNITS ASKED TO SUPPORT BOY SCOUTS

Guard units across the nation have been asked to support Boy Scout Troops by Major General Winston P. Wilson, National Guard Bureau Chief. He asked, in a January 11 letter, that Adjutants General support the Scouts' "Boypower '76" program which is designed to involve at least one-third of all Scout-age American boys in a quality Scout program by 1976. Army Brigadier General Benjamin T. Harris (Ret.), Director of Military Relationships for the Boy Scouts of America, is project coordinator.

VETERANS ELIGIBLE FOR ADDITIONAL BENEFITS

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -- About 7 million World War II and Korean Conflict veterans who financed their homes with Veterans Administration-guaranteed loans before May 7, 1968, are eligible for additional home loan benefits, the VA has announced. Interested veterans should contact their nearest VA office.
