VIRGINIA NATIONAL GUARD LICENSE AVAILABLE TO ALL GUARDSMEN

SPECIAL VIRGINIA NATIONAL GUARD LICENSE PLATES


Effective 1 April 1975, Special Virginia National Guard license plates will be available to all members of the Virginia National Guard. Two sets of plates will be authorized, except as indicated in para 2.

For the 1975-1976 license plate, general and field grade officers may apply for special reserved numbers from 1 to 100. There will be an extra charge of \$10.00 for this privilege. Applications for these reserved numbers may be submitted to this headquarters for assignment of a number based upon grade and date of rank. Since there are over 100 general and field grade officers in the Virginia National Guard, it will be necessary to limit 1 set to those applying for the reserved numbers. Applications (VSA Form 10) may be obtained by writing to the Commissioner, DMV, Post Office Box 27412, Richmond, Virginia, 23269. Applications for reserved numbers must be submitted to this headquarters, ATTN: VAAG-AA, no later than 1 September 1974.

The plates for 1975-1976 will be white background with green letters and numerals and will be the same format as the existing one except they will not be embossed with the Minuteman or the F-105D. The absence of any such image is necessary to allow for at least four numbers to be embossed thereon.

Assignment of numbers for officers, warrant officers and certain senior enlisted personnel will continue to be processed as outlined in VaARNGR 56-3/VaANGR 75-1. All other personnel will make application directly to the Commissioner, Division of Motor Vehicles, Richmond, Virginia. A form will be designed at this headquarters which will be completed at unit level. Personnel desiring special plates must obtain a copy of the form,

MORE WOMEN JOIN RESERVES

WASHINGTON--Female participation in the Air Force Reserve and the Air National Guard has picked up during recent months.

Through the last six months of 1973, female membership in the Air Guard rose from 608 to 1079. During the same period, AFReserve recruiters signed up another 526 women.

In the Reserve, 1.6 percent of the selected enlisted force now is female.

THE SUPPLY SIDE

Procedures on ordering clothing items from EMO were printed in both the March and April issues of the VANGUARD this year. However, these procedures are still not being followed by many individuals. For example: There were sixty-eight (68) request forms filled out during the month of May. Thirty-three (33) of the forms lacked either specific size information, quantity required, or in some cases, even the requestor's name. All thirty-three (33) of the forms had not been signed by an EMO representative.

It was clearly stated in the procedures printed in the VANGUARD issues that the requestor ensure both copies of the request forms are signed, not initialed, but signed, by an EMO representative.

This signature is required for three (3) reasons: (1) To ensure that request form is properly filled out regarding sizes and quantities of items and complete information is given on bottom of form; (2) To <u>VERIFY</u> that your request has been made; (3) Gives the requestor a tangible, valid document to use for recourse in case no action has been taken to fill his request within a reasonable amount of time (3 UTA's). Requests will continue to be filled by EMO until our quarterly clothing allotment has been expended; however, the EMO will not be held accountable for any clothing re-quest form that hasn't been signed by an EMO representative. The procedures have been written, but serve no useful purpose unless they are followed by everyone - - - SO - - - HELP US HELP YOU!

NAME TAGS

ALL personnel (officers and airmen) whose last name begins with any letter from A - L, report to EMO this UTA and pick up their required two (2) plastic name tags.

EXPANDED CBPO SERVICE

The CBPO has expanded its' services by opening another office, the CUSTOMER SERVICE CENTER. The purpose of this office is to provide quick, factual answers, or services to all UNSCHEDULED CBPO customers. All questions or problems will be handled confidentially, promptly and efficiently by a highly qualified personnel technician and answers will be provided by telephone or written reply. Some of the services provided for UNSCHEDULED CBPO customers are as follows:

1. Provide immediate answers or response to written, telephone or personal queries.

2. Schedule referral appointments for CBPO work units.

3. Accept information on change of address and telephone numbers.

4. Prepare AF Fm 279 and AF Fm 246.

Please note that all persons scheduled in the Official Bulletin should report to the appropriate CBPO work center as indicated.

EXCHANGE PRIVILEGES

According to a letter from the Department of Defense, Air National Guardsmen, along with other reservists, soon may be authorized unlimited exchange privileges on any day of the month. Under the current policy, only the very few Air Guardsmen stationed at active Air Force bases have been able to use these facilities. In the vast majority of cases, remote training locations and training schedules preclude use of the exchanges.

A spokesman for the National Guard Association says that although action on the authorization itself will be quick, it may take up to six weeks for the exchange service to make sure "the machinery is well-oiled" to afford Guardsmen unlimited privileges.

CIVIL DISTUBANCE TRAINING

Civil Disturbance Training will be conducted on the 5th and 6th of Oct 74 for all personnel assigned to the Base Security Force, Quick Reaction Team and Security Police. Attendance is mandatory. RESERVES' WIG RULES DUE FOR EARLY CHANGE

WASHINGTON -- Headquarters last week was putting the finishing touches on an emergency change to AFM 35-10, the uniform manual, that would permit the wear of wigs by nonactive duty Reserves and Guardsmen.

The action follows a recent circuit court decision which overturned AF's ban on the wear of hairpieces by "weekend warriors".

More than 20 additional suits filed by Air Reservists and Guardsmen over the same issue currently are in the courts. The policy change, still being drawn up late last week, is expected to moot these cases.

The revision to the rules is expected to be added to the manual as an "exception" rather than a change to existing policy.

THIS MEANS the current prohibition banning the wear of wigs by male AFers except to cover baldness of disfigurement still will apply to active duty AFers.

Female AFers can wear wigs which meet normal AF grooming standards.

However, this distinction, too, is under court challenge. Two active duty male AFers have filed suit challenging the legality of AF's setting different rules on the wear of wigs for male and female members. No hearings on that case have been set.

The pending rules change is expected to provide for an exception to current wig policy for Reserves and Guardsmen during periods of nonEAD service, and also during active duty stints of up to 30 days.

THIS IS THE procedure adopted by the other services, all of which previously have come to grips with the issue by easing restrictive rules on the wear of wigs by nonEAD members.

There is some official concern that permitting nonEAD members to wear wigs during up to 30 days of active duty for training could cause morale problems among active duty members. On such stints, the Reserves and Guardsmen work side by side with their active duty counterparts, who still will be barred from wearing wigs.

Some officials feel AF should grab the lead in what could be a continuing battle over individual rights of servicemen by making the wig-wear policy operational across-the-board, for active as well as nonEAD members. But there appears little chance this will happen.

SGLI BOOST APPROVED

WASHINGTON -- The Senate has approved legislation to (1) increase maximum Serviceman's Group Life Insurance coverage for active duty military members from \$15,000 to \$20,000 and (2) provide fulltime SGLI coverage for Reserve Forces members. The broadened coverage would be effective the date the bill is signed into law.

In addition, the measure establishes a new low-cost five-year term life insurance program for new veterans.

The legislation now goes back to the House, which passed a more limited measure last year.

CURRENTLY, VETERANS only can convert their SGLI coverage to a high-cost commercial plan. And they must do so within 120 days of separation. The only advantage the SGLI conversion plan offers is that policyholders can convert without a physical examination.

Under the proposed new Veterans Group Life Insurance program, coverage automatically would become effective 120 days after separation.

The new VGLI program would reduce insurance costs by more than 75 percent for most veterans during the first five years. The veteran then could convert to a commercial whole life policy under the same conditions as he can under SGLI.

THE SERVICES -- particularly the Army -- have made a strong pitch for Congress to broaden SGLI coverage for drill members of the National Guard and Reserve. Under the Senate bill, they would be eligible for the same \$20,000 maximum SGLI coverage as members of the active forces, and at the same premiums.

Members of the Guard and Reserve currently are covered by SGLI only during training assemblies, summer encampments or cruises, and for travel to and from authorized training activities.

The legislation also would provide fulltime protection for members of the Retired Reserve under the age of 60. These are officers and enlisted men who have performed at least 20 years of satisfactory service and are awaiting their first military retirement check. They generally begin receiving an annuity at age 61. Their premiums would be higher.

In a report on the legislation, the Senate Veterans Committee said there currently are 115,644 reservists in the Retired Reserve who would be eligible for SGLI protection.
