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RESERVE CALLUP BILL

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - The House Armed Services Committee has forwarded to the full House a bill to permit ordering reservists to active duty for a limited period, whether or not a declaration of war or national emergency has been declared.

This legislation will give the President authority to call to active duty for a period not to exceed 90 days, up to 50,000 members of the Selected Reserve without a declaration of national emergency.

The authority contained in this bill is an important step in the continued development of the effectiveness of the Reserve program.

In the past, the Reserve program has been seriously hampered by a lack of modern equipment and the reluctance on the part of the active duty force to assign realistic, meaningful missions to the Reserves. This reluctance stems from a concern that scarce equipment and important missions should not be allocated to units whose availability in time of crisis depended upon either a congressional declaration of war or a declaration of national emergency by the President.

This legislation provides a fast method of activating reservists for operational missions. It will help establish the credibility of the Reserve components and ease their integration into the defense structure.

military services in cases involving the permissible length of servicemen's hair.

At the time of the decision, the Court of Military Appeals had yet to decide a case questioning the Army's right to regulate hair lengths.

The Supreme Court ruled that the hair regulations are one of the many demands that state and local governments may make on policemen in the interests of "discipline, esprit de corps and uniformity."

Justice William H. Rehnquist who wrote the majority opinion, noted that the justices recognized that "... the county has chosen a mode of organization which it undoubtedly deems (to be) the most efficient in enabling its police to carry out the duties assigned to them."

The six-to-two decision also upheld the police regulation which banned wigs to conceal long hair while on duty.

LONG HAIR IN THE HIGH COURT

WASHINGTON (AFNS) - Airmen hoping for a Supreme Court decision in favor of longer hair styles suffered a setback recently along with policemen of Suffolk County, Long Island, N.Y.

On April 1, 1976, the Supreme Court upheld the right of police departments to prohibit beards and regulate the length of police officers' hair. The wording of the decision left little doubt that it would be cited as precedent by the

AFR 265-1 makes provisions for the spiritual development and pastoral care of members of the ANG. The Unit Commander is responsible for the religious life, morals, and morale of unit personnel, and the Chaplain is the Commander's OIC of the Group Chaplain Section. The Chaplain's responsibility is to fulfill the requirements of AFR 265-1.

Very high among the Chaplain's responsibilities is the provision of religious services for all persons during UTA's and Annual Field Training. The Chaplain conducts services for all personnel of his own faith group--General Protestant --and has arranged for religious coverage for other faith groups. MSgt Melvin O. SECURITY POLICE CORNER

REPORTING AND INVESTIGATING
ESPIONAGE, SABOTAGE, TERRORISM, AND
SUBVERSION (AFR 205-57)

This regulation describes the threat to the Air Force posed by hostile overt, covert, and clandestine activities in the fields of sabotage, espionage, terrorism, and subversion. It describes situations that must be reported to commanders and requires them to report these situations to the OSI. It requires an initial and annual briefing on the techniques of hostile intelligence services and the reporting requirements of this regulation.

1. Techniques of Hostile Intelligence Services:

a. Sabotage - Defined as weakening or destroying the war potential or war effort of a nation.

(1) Techniques of sabotage include:

(a) Tampering with mechanical devices, removing lubricants from machinery, and severing cables and electrical lines.

(b) Arson.

(c) Use of explosives.

b. Espionage - Defined as the practice of spying on others in order to obtain desired information.

(1) Techniques of espionage include:

(a) Unauthorized copying, photographing, or reproducing useful information.

(b) Blackmail - usually accomplished by threatening to divulge the victims personal indiscretions.

(c) Discreet questioning of personnel who have or have had access to classified information.

(d) Penetration of military or civilian installations where worthwhile information may be obtained.

(e) Analysis of extracts from newspapers, magazines, and similar articles.

c. Subversion - Defined as any activity by which individuals willfully attempt to impair the loyalty, morale, or discipline of any member of the Armed Forces.

(1) Techniques of subversion include:

(a) Efforts to discredit military establishments.

(b) Efforts to undermine the friendship between the US and its allies.

(c) Attempts to break down morale of troops.

(d) Activities designed to stimulate sympathy for the enemies of the US.

2. Reporting Requirements of AFR 205-57.

a. You are required to immediately notify your supervisor who will notify the squadron commander (who will notify the OSI) immediately on becoming aware of any of the following activities or situations:

(1) Any attempts to collect information by, or on behalf of unauthorized individuals or organizations. For example, attempts to obtain names or biographic data on Air Force personnel, copies of Air Force telephone directories and rosters, information on the identification, mission and location of Air Force installations and units, and performance data of military equipment.

(2) Actions by individuals, organizations, or foreign government which you believe may be against the interests of national security. For example, plans or conspiracies to overthrow the US.

(3) Contacts, social or otherwise of an Air Force member or his dependent with individuals or organizations whose interests are inimical to the US. Contacts may be in person, by correspondence, radio, telephone, and other means of communication. This rule does not apply if these contacts have been officially approved and sponsored.

(4) An indication that a member or his dependent is disloyal to the US. However, expressing discontent with one's job by griping or malingering should not be confused with disaffection or disloyalty.

(5) Sabotage or attempted sabotage.

(6) Offers to provide the Air Force with services or information of intelligence value by anyone known or suspected to be in contact with foreign intelligence activities.

b. In the absence of overriding circumstances, take no further action to disturb the existing relationship between the parties involved in the situation until further instructions are received. In any event, it is imperative that only a minimal number of personnel become knowledgeable and the situation will not be discussed further.

BILLETING CHANGES

192d Tactical Fighter Group Intelligence Officer Major George Davis and his wife Betty review their recently awarded diplomas. Major Davis, a recent graduate of the Air War College, received his diploma from Colonel William Haymes, Virginia's Assistant Adjutant for Air, during ceremonies conducted during the May UTA. Mrs. Betty Davis was also presented a diploma by Colonel Haymes. Her diploma was awarded for the outstanding understanding and patience it took to "put him through." Major Davis is also a graduate of the Air Command and Staff Course which he took both in residence and by correspondence. Other courses he has completed include the Industrial College of the Armed Forces and Squadron Officers School.

Master Sgt Robert W. Mantlo of the 192d Tactical Fighter Group, Virginia Air National Guard, Sandston, has been named the Outstanding Enlisted Guardsman of the Year.

A 37-year old native of Highland Springs, Mantlo heads the Life Support Shop at the Virginia Air Guard's base at Byrd International Airport and is assistant chief of the Guard's fire and crash rescue unit.

After graduation from Highland Springs High School and while working as a printer, he joined the Air Force Reserve in 1957. In 1958 he transferred to Virginia Air Guard as a supply technician. After spending a year on active duty during the 1961 Berlin crisis, he decided to become a full-time Guardsman.

In 1966, he first became involved in the area of life support equipment, and he was a volunteer on an Air Guard crash truck that helped extinguish last June's major fire at the Little Oil Company in South Richmond.

Mantlo is active in community efforts around Sandston, where he lives with his wife and three sons. He has been a coach of the Sandston Jets Youth League football team for the past four years. He is also a member of the Exchange Club of East Henrico and a manager of the Club 149, a private facility for Air Guardsmen and their families.

Mantlo's unit, made up of two fulltime and three parttime specialists, is responsible for maintaining the pilots' personal equipment and for training pilots in various flight safety and emergency equipment. Included in the life-saving and life preserving items are flight helmets, parachutes, oxygen masks, gravity and flight suits, ejection seats, and life rafts.

Prior to Mantlo's selection as the State's Guardsman of the Year, he was selected Virginia Air Guardsman of the Year by the Air Force Association. Before his selection as Air Guardsman of the Year he had been selected as Unit NCO of the Quarter.

In being considered for the top award Mantlo was judged on a number of subjects, including military appearance, general knowledge, job knowledge, current events, participation in community service and recruiting efforts.

For his achievement, Mantlo received the Virginia National Guard Commendation Medal, a \$50 U. S. Savings Bond, and an engraved "Minuteman" trophy. The other finalists received a \$25 U. S. Savings Bond.
