LTC LUNDIE RETIRES

31 May 1978 was the culmination of 35 1/2 years of military service for Lt Col Wallace R. Lundie. On this date, Lt Col Lundie retired from the Virginia Air National Guard. He was the Commander of the 192d Combat Support Squadron.

Lt Col Lundie enlisted in the U.S. Army Air Corps in December 1942 as an Avaiation Cadet. Upon completion he was awarded the aeronautical rating of pilot and commissioned a 2d Lt.

During \hat{WW} II he served in Belgium and Germany flying combat sorties in the F-47 fighter.

He was separated from the U.S. Army Air Corps on 18 April 1946, when he transferred to the Inactive Reserve Officer Corps as a 1 Lt.

He was employed by Philip Morris, Inc. in Richmond for a short time. Then became self employed, operating his own service station in Richmond.

In June 1948, he applied for and was accepted as a pilot in the 149th, VaANG. He served until February 1951, when the unit was recalled to active duty during the Korean Crisis. He served on active duty at Turner Field, Georgia, and at Godman Field, Kentucky, until April 1953, when he was separated as a captain.

Upon demobilization, he was again transferred to the Inactive Reserves. Upon reactivation of the 149th, he again was appointed as a pilot in the VaANG. Through a medical disqualification, Lt Col Lundie was removed from flying status. He was subsequently assigned to Supply, where he served until May 1959, when be became an Air Technician. At this time, he was assigned Adjutant, 149th TFS.

He served as Adjutant, Personnel Officer until October 1961, when the unit was again recalled. This time for the Cuban Crisis. He served as Personnel Officer during the period of EAD and reverted again to Guard status. This time as a major.

He was promoted to Lt Col on 22 April 1964, and assumed command of the 192d CSS on 1 August 1964. He remained in this position until his separation by retirement on 31 May 1978.

Lt Col Lundie is married to the former Lois Louise Shaw, has two sons, John Timothy, 28, and William Randolph, 24. Lt Col Lundie will be sorely

UNIFORM CHANGES ANNOUNCED

Eight uniform policy actions have been approved by the Air Force -Uniform Board.

A major item change will be the replacement of the current men's short-sleeved shirt by one with a convertible collar and epaulets. The convertible collar will allow wear of the shirt with a tie, open at the neck or with blouse, similar to the present long-sleeved shirt with epaulets.

Security police personnel will be permitted to wear a subdued cloth patch replica of the metal security police identification badge on the left pocket of the utility shirt. The patch will be of dark blue thread on an olive green background and can be worn by both male and female personnel.

Security police women can position their identification badge on the right side of blue uniform combinations, one-half inch above the name tag.

The board also approved the wearing of two badges above the miniature medals on formal dress uniforms by all persons.

Other changes include:

-development and wear of miniature versions of the explosive ordnance disposal, security police qualification, air traffic controller and weapons controller badges;

-modifying the back shoulder boards worn by personnel participating in the Airman Education and Commissioning Program to add silver stripes:

-allowing Civil Air Patrol members to wear a one-peice, threeline, blue nameplate instead of black: and

-developing an improved sweater for both male and female personnel.

Because of the rising cost of gasoline, getting the most fuel for your money is important to every car owner today. Here are some of the items that affect the miles per gallon you get from your car:

Weight is the most important. Gasoline mileage is reduced by 1 to 2 percent for every 100 pounds of added weight.

• An air conditioner weighs approximately 100 pounds. When it is running, gas mileage decreases by 9 percent to as much as 20 percent during stop-and-go driving.

• The automatic transmission can reduce fuel economy up to 15 percent.

• Radial tires generally produce better gas mileage than normal bias ply tires.

• High speeds increase gasoline consumption.

SAFETY

In a recent speech given by the former govenor of Arizone, who had also been the president of the National Safety Council for 15 years, he continually reminded us that around our own homes we face some potentially serious safety problems. And the latest issue of the USAF/USN Safety Officer's Study Kit really reenforces that talk.

Consider the case of the 34 year old man who received burns on his arms while using a caustic drain cleaner to unclog a bathroom sink. Fifteen minutes after applying the chemical he ran water into the sink, but the drain remained clogged. Then, contrary to the instructions on the package, he attempted to use a plunger to clear the drain, and the solution in the sink splashed on his arms.

The point is that this man was not familiar with the limitations of the material he was using, and consequently he was injured. We're all aware of the potential problems involved with gasoline so we don't take chances by smoking when we're refueling our cars or lawn mowers. And we must become just as familiar with other products used around the home if we're to avoid accidents.

Another potential safety problem around the house has arisen in recent years with the advent of aerosol cans. In a recent incident here in Richmond, a housewife finished spraying the inside of her oven with an aerosol cleaner when she decided to treat herself to a cup of instant coffee. After setting the can down next to the stove she settled back into a kitchen chair for a few quiet minutes when suddenly the aerosol can exploded and flew by her head. Fortunately, no one was injured but it points out that the warning on aerosol cans, "Don't store near sources of heat", means just that!

In order to avoid incidents like those mentioned above, we should read the labels of products before we buy them. And then before using the products we should read the entire label and follow all the manufacturer's instructions. In this way we'll at least be able to take the proper action if an accident does occur, and not compound our problem!

SHAVING WAIVERS ARE TABOO

There are no provisions in Air Guard regulations for "shaving waivers", even if you have a thriving case of Pseudofolliculitis Barbae. It's nothing more serious than old fashioned barbers' itch, says the Air Surgeon in the NGB, and it's treatable. Seems that some ANGer's have been obtaining something called "shaving waivers" from civilian medical practitioners and have presented them to Commanders on drill day to explain shaggy beards.

Commanders, First Sergeants and supervisors now have a problem or a Guardsman with a problem, let's see if it can be resolved with the following information.

a. AFR 35-10 (dated 15 Jul 77) Table 1-1, Item 16, Beards (CoI E) states, "Beards must not be worn mander on the advice of a physician for health reasons." It further states all medically authorized facial hair must be kept trimmed so not to exceed 1/4 inch in length. Commanders monitor program to control this authority.

b. The State Air Surgeon Virginia, Col Howell, goes on a little further. He states the following, "The Air Guardsman will resolve his problem by treatment with his civilian medical practitioner and such treatment will not exceed 90 days. If possible, the Air Guardsman will shave just prior to the UTA. If shaving is not possible, the Guardsman will be excused from UTAs until the condition is cured (not to exceed 90 days), or the condition is determined to be chronic. Also, the Air Guards-man should be aware that the 192d TAC Clinic cannot treat injury or disease cases that have occurred prior to UTA or AFT and it is the Guardsman's responsibility to report any and all conditions that may affect his worldwide duty status.

c. If this skin condition is suspected by a Unit Commander to be chronic, he may schedule with the Clinic a physical examination to determine the severity. If it is determined to be a chronic condition, the Guardsman will be disqualified for continued service IAW AFR 160-43, Chapter 5, Para 5-18Y. It so states, "Other skin disease if chronic, or of a nature which requires frequent medical care or interferes with the satisfactory performance of military duty."

The above guidance for Commanders has been extracted from the National Guardsman Magazine, May 78; AFR 35-10, 15 July 77; AFR 160-43, June 76; and various other interviews.

CAR RENTAL DISCOUNT AVAILABLE TO GUARDSMEN

ANGSC Andrews AFB MD/LGRT has negotiated a car rental discount agreement on behalf of the DOD with the American International Rent-A-Car Corp. Within Conus, the discount is identified as a National Account Flat Rate and offers DOD a rate of \$15.95 a day on subcompact cars, \$19.95 on compact cars, \$20.95 for standard size cars and \$21.95 for full size cars. These rates provide unlimited free mileage with the customer paying for gas used.

The special discount rate is not applicable to intercity rentals within Conus. Information on this rate, advance reservations and information concerning locations participating in the special rate may be obtained by telephoning toll free 800-527-6346.

American International also offers a 15% discount on international rental rates. Contact the Company's toll free number for information on these rates.

The terms and discounts covered by this new agreement are available to all DOD employees, active, reserve, retired, military and civilian, performing personal, official or vacation travel and will be in effect until further notice. DOD travelers may obtain these discounts upon presentation of DOD identification cards, travel orders, or an American International ID card obtainable from the company.

RED FLAG '78

Red Flag '78 was an interesting and exciting challenge for the members of the 192d TFG that accompanied the eight F-105s to Nellis AFB, Nevada, for two weeks of simulated combat training. addition to the air to air and air to ground combat tactics learned by the Unit's pilots, Red Flag gave maintenance personnel an opportunity to experience the loading of live 500 lb. bombs, preparing for quick turns of the aircraft, and working the long hours they might expect to see in an actual combat situation.

In addition to the maintenance and flying activities, support personnel gained experience keeping track of billeting and meal requirements, supply requests, and transportation problems in a different and very busy environment.

Three pilots participated in the Red Flag Search and Rescue Training which gave them a pretty good look

at some of the conditions they might expect to find should they be shot down during an actual combat mission. Lt Col "Tee" Coke was dropped by helicopter about 300 miles from Nellis AFB. He and a Marine, Lt Col Fritz Manning, were dropped about a mile apart. They had to rendezvous, identify each other, and call in a rescue helicopter to evacuate them while trying to avoid potential enemy threat in the form of a group of search and rescue personnel who played the role of the enemy and tried to capture the downed airmen before they could rendezvous and be rescued.

Lt Col Al Washington, 149th TFS Commander, and Capt Bill Campenni participated in the water search and rescue version. They were dropped about a mile apart on Lake Meade. All they carried were their normal flight survival kits. Each had to inflate their raft, blow up their life preservers, and use radio calls and mirrors to signal rescue aircraft.

SECURITY

Recently during the conduct of a random after duty hour inspection, a security policeman approached a seemingly locked safe and pulled open the top drawer. The resultant inquiry disclosed that the person who 'locked the container spinned the dial several times and pulled on the locking drawer (second Assured that the condrawer). tainer was secure, the AF Form 301 was annotated, and the attendant departed for the day. The official designated to conduct the Room and Area Check also turned the dial and pulled on the handle of the locking drawer, but did not activate the latch and pull the remaining drawers. Some security containers will not lock unless all the drawers are securely closed. Once the lock is activated the dial spins freely, that is the assurance that the entire container is However, .we must stress secure. that this is not true for every brand container. Procedures must be established and followed to assure that each drawer latch is activated and checked for proper locking. Pull hard on the drawers-It's far better to take a few extra seconds and be assured that all drawers are locked. It sure can ruin one's dinner, by receiving a call from the office announcing an unsecured container.
