## Stockner, Yeary gain top positions in CAMRON

The 192TFG Commander has announced that LTC James F. Stockner has assumed the position of Deputy commander of Maintenance, and CPT Harold T. Yeary has become the Maintenance Squadron Commander. Both changes were effective 16 February 1982.

LTC Stockner's career started in October 1950 when he joined the unit and was assigned to the munitions area. After serving 16 months of active duty and working on F47 type aircraft, Stockner was released and reenlisted when the unit was reorganized in 1953. A year later, he was hired as a technician and put on flying status as an engineer until the coming of the F84s. During the '60s, he was assigned to maintenance control and was later appointed Fire Control Shop Supervisor.



LTC Stockner was commissioned in September 1971 when the 192TFG converted to F105 aircraft. Since then, he has held the positions of Avionics Officer, Maintenance Control Officer and Maintenance Squadron Commander.

Yeary, a veteran of 16 years in the VaANG, was commissioned in 1978 as the Organizational Maintenance Officer after completing the Academy of Military Science. His prior service time as an enlisted member was highlighted by his selection of Recruiter of the Year for 1977 by the Richmond Chapter of the Air Force Association in addition to being cited for meritorious



achievements in the recruiting area for a period of two years. He was awarded the State Bronze Star for his efforts.

A native of Lee County, Va., now residing in Glen Allen, Yeary has been a stabilizing force in achieving a smooth transition of weapon systems.

"We have taken a big step over the past year," said Yeary. He smiled as another readied aircraft rolled out of the hangar.

#### Assistance Fund off to slow start; goal anticipated

The 1982 fund raising campaign for the Air Force Assistance Fund (AFAF) began on 1 March 1982 and, for the Air National Guard, will continue through 1 June 1982. The theme this year is "Commitment to Caring: An Air Force Family Affair". The Air Force goal is \$3.65 million. The VaANG has not set a monetary goal, but hopes to have at least 90% participation from its members. During the month of March, twentyfour percent of all VaANG members gave something to the campaign. Although off to a slow start in March because of mobility and disaster preparedness exercises, the April and May UTAs should provide ample opportunity to reach the 90% AFAF participation goal.

Major General John B. Conaway, Director of the Air National Guard, in a letter to all ANG members. noted that ANG support of this extremely worthy effort continues to increase due, in part, to the role AFAF is now playing in ANG members' lives. He quoted recent figures that showed that about 25% of all student loan applicants were ANG or AFRes members who have received a total of about five million dollars in loans. He urged each ANG member to make a contribution this year to affiliates of AFAF. The affiliates are the Air Force Aid Society, the Air Force Village and the Air Force Enlisted Men's Widows and Dependents

One affiliate, the AF Aid Society (AFAS), is currently working on realigning and expanding the eligibility requirements and categories of emergency financial assistance available to ANG members. These changes will probably be in effect within the next 12 months. AFAS already provides student loan assistance to ANG spouses and children as well as to the ANG members themselves.

VaANG members who want to contribute, but who have not yet been contacted by an AFAF worker, can do so by contacting their unit's AFAF Project Officer. If no Project Officer has been appointed, they can see unit commanders, The following units

#### Social Actions offers direction in three areas

The Social Actions Office has the responsibility to teach three classes to be consistent with training requirements. We teach SUBSTANCE ABUSE EDUCATION, SOCIAL ACTIONS ORIENTATION, and HUMAN RELATIONS EDUCATION. Questions arise about what areas are covered in each class. To help base personnel understand these classes, a description of each follows:

SUBSTANCE ABUSE EDUCATION - This class is offered on a continuous basis. All persons are to attend. Once the entire group has gone through the class, we start over. The training is designed to help base personnel understand the effects of drugs and alcohol on the individual Air Guard member. Presentations are made to encourage Air Guard people to think about the prevention of substance abuse. Illustrations are given that show how abuse of drugs and alcohol relates to the maintenance of Air Force standards. Air National Guard policy on alcohol and drugs is presented and discussed. Individuals are encouraged to enter discussions. Class participations learn about their responsibilities in the prevention of alcohol and drug abuse.

SOCIAL ACTIONS ORIENTATION - All Air National Guard members are to attend this class. Once all members have gone through this class, only the newly gained guardspeople will come to this class. This class is designed to give members information that helps to facilitate positive human relations on the base. The base level Affirmative Action Plan is presented and discussed. Social Actions personnel discuss why the plan was developed, what the plan is to accomplish and how each person fits in with plan implementation. There is a discussion of the complaint process guard members should follow if they have a need to file a complaint of discrimination.

HUMAN RELATIONS EDUCATION - The Human Relations class is offered to each supervisor, E-4 and above. After each member goes through the class, that member will not attend



class again until three years have passed. The class is designed to inform supervisors about the human relations climate on base and how they have the primary responsibility to set the climate that promotes positive human relations. The supervisor receives information about values, prejudices, and discriminatory practices that create people problems. There is discussion about the communication process and about factors that act as barriers to effective communication. Attention is given to some things supervisors can do to improve the base human relations climate and to assure equal opportunity and treatment for all members of the Virginia Air National Guard. #### 169TFG first ANG unit to receive F-16s

WASHINGTON (AFNS) -- The first Air National Guard unit to receive the F-16 Fighting Falcon will be the 169th Tactical Fighter Group, McEntire ANGB, S.C. This is part of the Air Force effort to provide the Guard with the same sophisticated equipment used by the regular Air Force.

Conversion is scheduled for late fiscal 1983. The A-7 Corsair aircraft now being flown by the 169th TFG will be sent to other Air National Guard units.

"This is the latest example of continuing Air Force efforts to include the Air Guard as a partner in the total force," Maj. Gen. John B. Conaway, Air National Guard director, said.



"Force modernization increases the Guard's capabilities to perform the federal mission of providing trained, well-equipped units which can be called to the defense of our nation in the event of national emergency or war.

During the past five years, 85 percent of our Air National Guard units have been modernized with newer, more modern equipment, including direct-from-the-factory A-7s, A-10s and C-130Hs. This announcement continues that exciting, significant trend," General Conaway

#### Schools to observe weight watchers

All Air Guard personnel who will be attending Air Force Technical Training Schools after 15 Apr 82 will be required to meet the revised weight standards as prescribed in AFR 35-11, dated 28 Jul

ANG personnel who do not meet the revised weight standards should be entered into the Weight Control Program prior to arrival at the AF Tech School.

Personnel arriving at Technical School who are overweight by the revised standards prescribed in AFR 35-11 and not enrolled in the formal Weight Control Program will not be entered in school but will be returned to their home unit.

### Your magic retirement numbers:

These articles will seem a lot more pertinent if you know when and if you're eligible for benefits, so we're going to start by letting you figure out your eligibility. It's as easy as 20-8-60.

8 - Have you served the last eight of those years in a Guard or Reserve unit?

60 - Are you 60 years of age or more?

If you can answer yes to all three of these questions, you're eligible for all kinds of National Guard Retirement Benefits. You can collect retirement pay, survivor benefits, medical care benefits. You can use military installation facilities and fly on the Space Available travel plan.

We'll be delving into each aspect of your retirement benefits in detail this year. We'll show you how to figure out exactly what benefits are due you and how to collect them. This month, we're focusing on one of the benefits you're likely to get the most enjoyment out of, use of military installation facilities.

It puts a wealth of services and goods at your fingertips. You and your spouse are eligible to patronize commissary stores, post exchanges, clothing sales stores, dry cleaning facilities, theaters, recreation facilities, officer clubs, guesthouse accommodations and beverage (class VI) stores. Availability of space, goods and

facilities anywhere in the world.

services should pose few problems in the United States. If you travel overseas, though, you're likely to find your access somewhat more limited. Medical care at U.S. facilities is a prime example. You're allowed to use the facilities anywhere you go, of course. But, they're organized on a space-available basis, and active duty personnel have first priority.

Also, as a retiree, you may not be eligible overseas for the same duty-free purchases and services as an active duty soldier. That's up to the individual country though,

so check ahead.

Actually, conditions are under constant review and are subject to change without notice, so it pays to check with overseas commanders ahead of time to see what facilities are available.

#### Student loan advisory

The Federal Government is still in the process of establishing guidelines for the 1982-1983 Guaranteed Student Loan Program. Therefore, the Air Force Aid Society is delayed in making the necessary revisions to the Henry H. Arnold and George S. Brown application forms and brochures for the 1982-1983 programs.

Until the new forms can be printed the following schedule will be complied with by the Air Force Aid Society in processing appli-

A. For 1981-1982 School Year: An application will be accepted for processing if a minimum of 100 days remains on the loan period requested.

B. For 1982-1983 School Year: An application for a loan period beginning after 30 June 1982 will not be processed since the application form is obsolete.

It is anticipated that application forms for the 1982-1983 school year will be distributed to the field by mid-May.

#### **OPSEC** Update

Now that nearly all (954) unit personnel have successfully passed the OPSEC testing program, which began last fall, it is time to consider the real meaning of this form of training. Realizing that many individuals assigned to the unit do not work with classified materials on a daily basis, it is important to remember that the enemy is interested in all areas of our operations, both classified and unclassified. The testing is only one method to keep all personnel informed in order for them to be able to effectively perform their assigned tasks and also utilize the proper OPSEC procedures. A strong OPSEC program requires the knowledge and support of every individual assigned to this unit. One person's carelessness or lack of knowledge, concerning OPSEC procedures, can go a long way in negating the efforts of the entire unit. This may sound like a strong statement; it is meant to be, because it is true.

It is no secret that the enemy is vitally interested in ALL aspects of our operations. Whether or not you choose to believe this is up to you. In order to find out, you can do one of two things. First, you can accept as factual the information furnished by the unit OPSEC program. Second, and probably better, you can do some homework of your own. Either way,


you will discover that the enemy does in fact expend vast amounts of money and resources to maintain an extensive network to monitor our activities.

This month is an ideal time to really look at how you utilize your OPSEC training. First, we have almost completed our conversion in the A-7D program. This is certain to mean more tasking and additional unit requirements. Second, during this month's UTA, we will have a mini ORI. This is an ideal time to

look at how you can implement these areas of the OPSEC program, to which you have been exposed. Finally, how we perform during the up-coming ORI, will be noted by both the 9 AF IG Team and also our constant companion. Let's show both parties how a real professional team operates.

#### OPSEC TIPS TO CONSIDER

- 1. Realize the consequences of compromise of national security.
- Set a good example by motivating others to practice sound OPSEC procedures.
- Interfere with enemy data collection by considering <u>ALL</u> transmissions as being monitored by unfriendly forces.
- 4. Don't compromise the defense effort by "talking around" sensitive information.
- Don't improvise voice codes. Use assigned and authorized code systems, nicknames, or call signs.

#### Military education essential for officers

The professional military education (PME) of its officers is vital to the continued success of the Air National Guard. This was the sentiment of Col Richard E. Moss, Chief of the Office of Training, National Guard Bureau, as he announced FY 83 PME schedules to the Adjutants General of all states, territories and the District of Columbia in an ANG-CS/TET letter dated 25 Feb 1982.

PME can be completed either in residence or by correspondence. The best way, because of the interaction of students, is the residence course. Students from all branches of U.S. and of some allied services usually attend residence courses.

The FY 83 PME residence schedule is as follows:

#### Security Police role important during ORI

SECURITY: This information is provided for all 192TFG personnel in order to give each of you a better understanding of the security mission during the upcoming ORI.

TAC-gained Security Police units are required to demonstrate the ability to secure and protect all AF resources within a restricted aircraft parking area on the flightline. This means that the 192d Weapons System Security Flight must provide priority "B" protection for assigned aircraft during Annual Field Training/Operational Readiness Inspection.

Priority "B" Security Protection requires that the Security Police be posted on Entry Control Points and the marked boundaries of the restricted area. It also requires that a two-man Security Patrol (Alarm Response Team) be posted to patrol inside the restricted area boundaries. All these posts must be controlled by the Central Security Control (CSC). Because of the requirements, everyone who enters the restricted area must have a valid restricted area badge (AF

#### Wood to retire

Mr. Wilbur N. Wood Jr, Civilian Security Policeman with the Virginia Air National Guard for eight years, will retire effective 30 April 1982. Prior to employment with the VaANG, Mr. Wood held several positions designing and preparing window displays for various companies in the local area and Florida.

Mr. Wood is no novice to the military. He began a military career in 1940 with the Army National Guard. His unit was activated during World War II on 3 February 1941. 


