2. AM Assemblies will be 0700-1200 (Sat) 0700-1100 (Sun) and PM Assemblies will be 1300-1700 (Sat) 1200-1600 (Sun), with the following exceptions: Assembly for one flight of Food Service Personnel will be as follows: AM 0630-1030 (Sat) 0530-0930 (Sun), PM 1100-1530 (Sat) 1000-1430 (Sun). Additional duty hours to cover special work requirements such as pre-flight, post-flight, etc, will be scheduled by each unit as required. Each UTA will be no less than four hours duration excluding lunch periods.

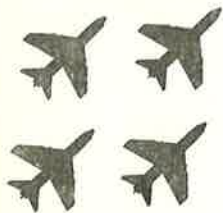
3. Uniform will be fatigues on Saturday and lightweight blues or fatigues on Sunday.

4. Excused absences from UTAs must be for reasonable cause and must be mutually arranged in advance by the individual and his/her commander. To be excused, an absence must be made up thru Equivalent Training (EQT) or Split Unit Training Assembly (SUTA). SUTAs must be performed for the convenience of the government and in the same month as the UTA. EQTs with pay must be performed within 60 days after scheduled UTA, but within the same fiscal quarter. Only four EQTs (1 weekend) with pay are permitted each Fiscal Year.

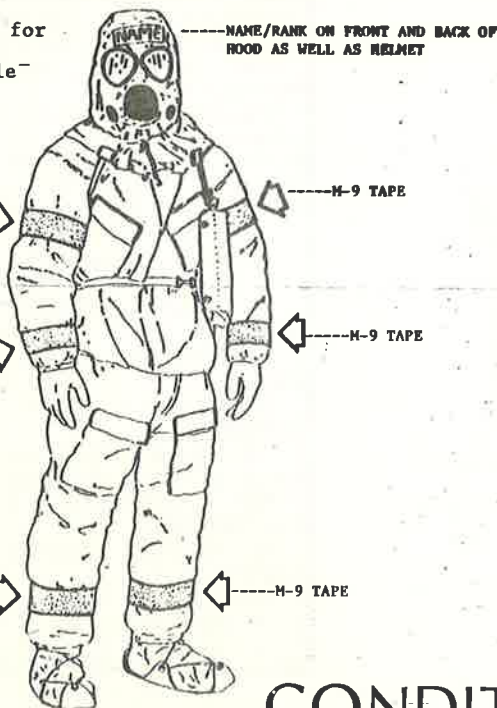

uniform requirements

An Operational Readiness Exercise is scheduled 27 FEBRUARY 1988. (This is the second UTA during the month of February). In order to better prepare for the ORE, preplanning is necessary. The information listed will help you to plan.

1. The exercise will commence approximately 0930 hours Saturday in Condition YELLOW, MOPP LEVEL 3. (SEE CHART BELOW). Priority "B" will be observed on the flightline.

2. The Contamination Control Area will be operating, however, there will be a change of location from previous exercises. The CCA will be located inside the Weapons Release Shop, Building 3633. Same rules apply, i.e., you must take a bus to or from the CCA (no foot traffic), when you are released from your duty station to go to the CCA don't anticipate being back at your work station in 10 or 15 minutes. The process and the theory behind the CCA is not a quick-in quick-out type of procedure.

3. Everyone must take a look at their ground crew ensemble to insure that it is marked "FOR TRAINING USE ONLY". This applies

to the jacket, pants, hood, boots, gloves, and M-17 mask. Also insure that 2" wide masking tape, which simulates M-9 Detection Tape, is placed on the GCE in the proper location. (SEE BELOW). Also be sure that your name is placed on the hood and helmet.

4. Nerve agent antidote, M258A1 Personal Decontamination Kit, are simulated items. They will be paper cards depicting the actual instruments. Keep these simulations in the UPPER RIGHT HAND JACKET POCKET OF THE GCE. This applies to this exercise as well as to the ORI in Savannah.

5. Be certain that you practice Self-Aid/Buddy Care, a positive prompt response to life threatening situations is an absolute necessity. What your trying to do is simply stabilize the victim by whatever means available and prepare him for transport to the Casualty Collection Point (CCP).

6. Keep in mind that when operating vehicles you must wear your safety belts. This includes operating under Condition BLACK. It is also necessary to keep the windows rolled up at all times.

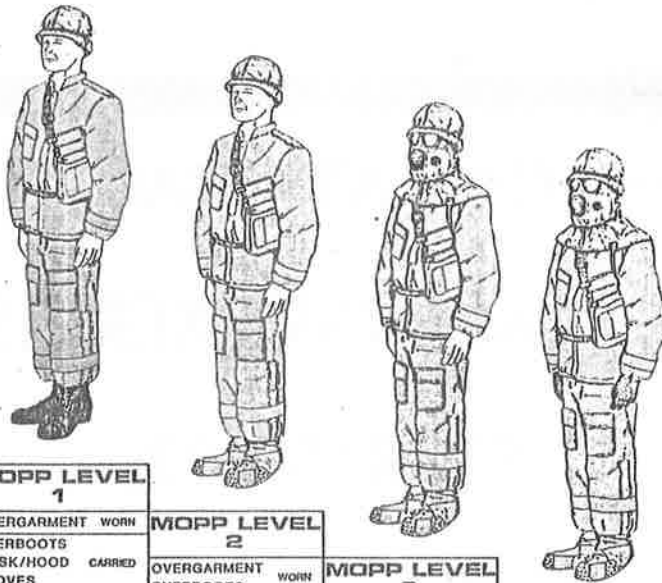

Marshall receives 192d Safety Award

Master Sergeant Jerome G. Marshall, 192 TFG, has been selected to receive the 192 TFG Safety Award for the period 1 July 1987 through 31 December 1987.

MSG Marshall is assigned to the 192 TFG serving as Assistant Base Visual Information Manager. He was nominated for this award by MSG Robert Flournoy, Visual Information Services Superintendent.

During the August UTA, MSG Marshall identified a potential safety hazard with the mounting of the large 25 inch TV monitor/receivers on the top of stands with sloped top shelves. The TV's have a forward center-of-gravity and, when placed on the sloped shelf, were susceptible to tipping over when moved or bumped. If one were to fall off, it would totally destroy the unit, but more seriously, it may fall on someone causing severe personal injury. MSG Marshall took the initiative to notify all users of the TV monitor, and the Safety Office, of the potential hazard. To render safe the existing conditions, he recommended that all units use a safety strap to secure the TV to the stand to prevent tipping. If a strap was not available, he researched and identified a suitable strap that could be

purchased through local purchase from the vendor. He further researched and identified a more suitable stand for future procurements that was safer and less costly.

Since all units have now been safely strapped, there have been no incidents of units tipping over. The important recognition here is that this is another classic example of accident prevention - Identify the hazard and correct it before it becomes an accident.

MSG Marshall's action further exemplifies the essential contributions of our part-time guardsmens to the Base Safety Program. They are involved in the safety programs of their employers and possess an enormous amount of technical expertise and safety experience in their respective fields. The Safety Office solicits and encourages safety cross-tell from everyone. As happens many times, working in or seeing the same environment everyday, a hazard may become commonplace and accepted as a normal condition.

Congratulations MSG Marshall for a job well done. He will receive a handsome plaque and an especially embroidered windbreaker jacket as recognition for this safety award.
