9th AF to inspect unit in August

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Be prepared

Here's a basic checklist to use when preparing for next month's Unit Effectiveness Inspection (UEI):

***Military Courtesy.** Snappy salutes are "in". So is addressing officers and senior ranking enlisted as "sir" or "ma'am."

***Smoking.** If you smoke, do it outside.

***Seatbelts.** Use them, always.

***Weight Control.** If you are overweight, make sure you're registered on the weight-control program.

***Personal Appearance.** Pay special attention to haircuts, mustache neatness, shined shoes, neat and properly worn uniforms, and authorized jewelry items.

***Security.** Know how to report security violations or possible helping hand or covered wagon incidents. Know who your security monitor is and his/her extension. Don't forget communications security and safeguarding classified information.

***Checkered Flag.** Know what it means, and the location of your Checkered Flag base.

***Duties.** Know your own duties and be able to describe them articulately to any inspector who asks what you do to support the mission. If you are asked a question for which you don't know the answer, tell the inspector you don't know but that you will check with your supervisor and get the correct answer.

Remember, first impressions are lasting. Be sharp, be enthusiastic, be remembered.

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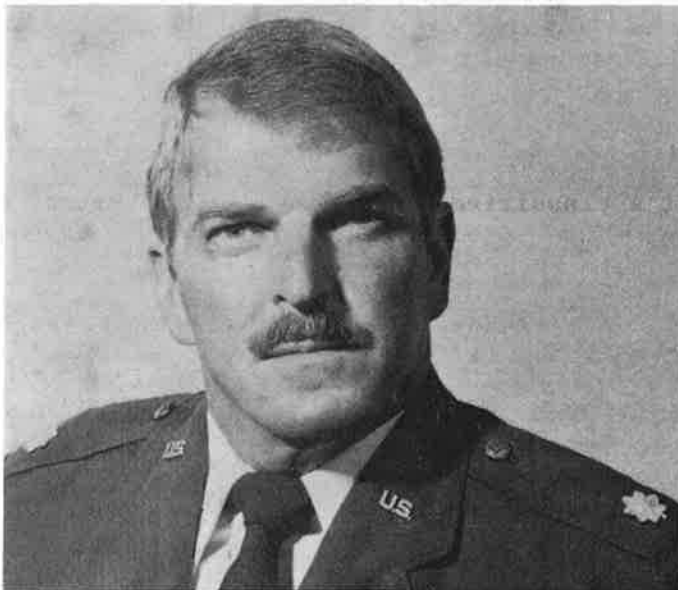

Change in dependency status requires a visit to military pay

Basic Allowance for Quarters (BAQ) is a non-taxable military pay entitlement, commensurate with a pay grade and dependency status, payable to members when performing active duty.

Therefore, it is absolutely necessary to notify military pay of any change in dependency status such as marriage, divorce, separated not providing support, child support, death, and birth.

Failure to support a dependent whose account BAQ is claimed will result in non-entitlement to BAQ.

Making a false statement or claim against the United States government is punishable by court martial and the penalty for willingly making a false statement or claim is a maximum fine of \$10,000 or maximum imprisonment of 5 years or both (18 U.S.C. 287).

unauthorized purchases

What is an unauthorized purchase action? It is action taken by anyone, other than a designated contracting officer, which obligates the U.S. government to pay for supplies or services received. Rank or position of an individual does not make a contracting officer. All contracting officers are required by federal law to be designated in writing, on a document called certificate of appointment issued by NGB, and are required to produce this written evidence whenever their authority to obligate the U.S. government is questioned.

Don't authorize purchases without the authority, unless you are able and willing to pay from your pocket!

Most of the military related publications I've read for the last few months seem to be concentrating on history, which led me to wonder how much we know about our own unit. For example, did you know the flying unit of Virginia's Air Guard, the 149th Tactical Fighter Squadron, is descended from the 328th Fighter Squadron of the 352nd Fighter Group of World War II fame? The 328th was commanded by 28 Victory Ace, George E. Preddy of North Carolina until his death in combat in 1944. The 328th received a distinguished unit citation in May of 1944 for its escort work in the European theatre of operations. The squadron also received the French Croix de Guerre with palm. The 328th Fighter Squadron was deactivated at the end of the war in 1945 and reactivated in May of 1946 when it was assigned to Virginia as the 149th Fighter Squadron.

Commissary privilege update

From ANGSC Msg P131500Z Jun 89

At last we have the news. On 6 June 1989, the Department of Defense announced that due to the non-availability of the programmed commissary privilege card (CPC), the interim commissary privileges which went into effect 1 Jan 1989 have now been extended until 1 July 1990.

The same rules will apply for establishing eligibility: A copy of any active duty orders for 1988 or 1989 and a valid ID card for sponsors or proof of dependency of an eligible sponsor for dependents. However, new limitations have been imposed. Each eligible member is allowed 12 shopping days for the period 1 July 1989 to 30 June 1990, as a basic entitlement. In addition, members are entitled to shop when in an active duty status with orders effective for that day. When entering the commissary the qualifying order will be date stamped. Members are cautioned to use the same set of orders for each entry to avoid exceeding the prescribed number of days of entitlement (12).

Customer service corner

This is the sixth and last in a series of questions and answers dealing with Servicemen's Group Life Insurance (SGLI). We hope these series dealing with death benefits and related subjects have been of great value to all our readers of the Vanguard. If you have misplaced any one of the prior five series or would like to ask a question arising from the material presented, please call MSgt Les W. Hart, CBPO, Ext. 310.

Q: When I complete 20 or more "good" years in the Reserves or National Guard, will I be able to continue my SGLI coverage once I am in the Retired Reserves?

A: Yes, members who are eligible for assignment to or are assigned to the Retired Reserve may continue their SGLI coverage after separation provided the initial premium is submitted directly to the SGLI office within 120 days following assignment to the Retired Reserve. **NOTE:** Suppose the scenario called for the member to not take any action whatsoever regarding the 120-day window. Coverage may be granted by initiating VA Form 29-8713 with evidence of insurability, and the initial premium must be submitted to OSGLI within 1 year after member's SGLI coverage had been terminated.

Q: I will separate from the Virginia Air National Guard in 90 days. What happens to my SGLI coverage?

A: Since you are a Ready Reserve member and if you qualify for full-time coverage, you will be covered for 120 days following your separation. No additional premium will come out of your pocket for those 120 days.

Q: I became totally disabled from a car accident and had to separate from the Guard. Will my SGLI coverage terminate?

A: A member totally disabled at separation will retain SGLI coverage for up to ONE YEAR or until the member's disability ceases, whichever occurs first. Keep in mind no additional premium will be charged to you during this year.

Maj. Sally Morger, public affairs officer at Virginia Air National Guard State Headquarters since January 1982, has transferred to the inactive reserves to accompany her husband on a three-year assignment to Japan.

Major Morger's husband, Air Force Maj. Randy Morger, this month will assume command of both the Far East Network (FEN), which is part of the Armed Forces Radio and Television Service, and the Air Force's Pacific Broadcast Squadron. The Morgers and their two sons will live at Yokota Air Base near Tokyo.

At a send-off luncheon last month, Brig. Gen. Joseph A. "Al" Washington, deputy adjutant general for air, presented Major Morger with the Air Force Meritorious Service Medal.

During her tour at VaANG State Headquarters, Major Morger spearheaded the unit's internal and external publicity efforts for a 1985 deployment to Norway; for three years edited the Guard in Review, an annual publication of the Virginia National Guard Officers Association; and designed the publicity campaign leading to the organization of the 203rd Civil Engineering Flight (Red Horse).

In 1986, she won the Lt. Col. James P. Gunter Award as the VaANG's outstanding junior officer. The award is presented annually by the Richmond Chapter of the Air Force Association.

"We greet Major Morger's departure with mixed feelings," General Washington said. "She has approached her job with a high degree of creativity and versatility. We're sad to lose her expertise and enthusiasm, but we're equally happy that she'll be able to broaden her horizons in the Far East."

Water safety

The period from May 1 to Sep 30 is a time when we lose part of our most valuable possession - Personnel! Needless fatalities and lost-time injuries result from carelessness on our part during work or recreational activities. To reduce the number of deaths and injuries to Air Guard personnel associated with the vacation season, we need only to adhere to a few simple common sense rules.

It is commonly thought that a drowning victim is someone who cannot swim. This is not always true. Many cases do not result from poor swimming ability, but from negligence or poor judgement.

Swim safely this summer and follow these guidelines:

- *Never swim alone. Always use the "buddy" system and make sure your buddy is always near to offer help.

- *Swim only at approved locations and only when a lifeguard is on duty.

- *Don't swim when overheated, overtired, or soon after eating.

- *Before diving, make sure the water is deep enough and free of hidden objects.

- *Know your ability. Distance over water can be misleading. Be prepared to return to a point of safety at all times.

- *Take a boat along when swimming in open water. Except for emergencies, avoid swimming in the dark.

- *Last, but not least, NO HORSEPLAY! The swimmer who allows horseplay is asking for trouble.

The 192d safety office wishes everyone an enjoyable summer. If we take time to follow these helpful reminders, our heads should stay above water.

TO: All Unit Personnel

1. Beginning with Fall semester classes, Virginia State University will begin offering courses that will be taught at the 192d Tactical Fighter Group, Byrd Field, Sandston, to all Virginia National Guardsmen interested in furthering their education. This program is being offered at the Base for the convenience of Virginia Air National Guardsmen, but is opened to civilians as well.
2. The classes will start on 11 September 1989 and run through 18 December 1989, two nights a week (Monday and Thursday) from 1730-2030 hrs.
3. Attached is a survey sheet of six (6) courses that VSU is considering offering this semester. The actual courses that will be taught, will be determined from the survey sheet that is to be returned to the CBPO NLT 15 August 1989.
4. VSU tuition is currently \$97.00 per semester hour. Sounds like a lot. However if you utilize the State Tuition Assistance Program, 50% of the tuition could be paid through this benefit currently available to guardsmen. Also, you may qualify for assistance through the Montgomery GI Bill Program. Additional information on these programs is available in the Base Career and Education Management Office located in the CBPO, Room 37B, O&T Building. State Tuition Assistance applications are due in the CBPO NLT 24 July 1989. For your convenience, a copy is attached.
5. Additional information concerning this outstanding program will be published in the August 1989 VANGUARD.
6. This program being offered by VSU is a great benefit to each guardsman. We encourage your participation.
