PEMBERTON ELECTED CHIEF OF ASSOCIATION

Maj. Robert H. Pemberton, budget officer for the Virginia Air National Guard's 192d Resource Management Squadron, this month will become president of the Virginia National Guard Association.

Major Pemberton, 43, of Woodbridge, will be the first black Guardsman elected president of the 1,449-officer organization. He is the first Air Guard member to hold the presidency since Lt. Col. Basil H. Evans Jr. was association president in 1980-81.

"In addition to being quite an honor, this post brings with it the responsibility to help set policy and foster growth," Major Pemberton said. "The state's National Guard officers, as a body, can have a tremendous impact on state policy as it affects the Guard. We can also affect legislation on a national level, through our participation in the nationwide National Guard Association.

"Our Number One goal, as I see it, is getting the word out to the officers about what the association really is," he said. Better communication should lead to increased participation, he added.

Tech. Sgt. Ken Hill of the 192d Visual Information Library nominated Gibbs for his genuine interest in Air Guard activities, citing his understanding in providing time off for training, as well as the company's generosity in providing difference pay for 28 days of military duty. In the past, Sergeant Hill's deployment schedule has sometimes allowed only short notice to his employer, and still he was allowed time off without hesitation.

Colonel Shurley described the value of this type of support, saying "Employer support is extremely important to the Virginia Air National Guard. With the many demands placed on a Guardsman today, without employer support, many would be forced to leave the Guard. This support is important and appreciated."

Without the support and cooperation of their civilian employers, members of the Guard and Reserve often encounter problems in their efforts to perform their duty. As Colonel Rose points out, lack of employer support would have heavy costs for the 192d TFG in terms of maintaining operational readiness. "We're dependent on Guardsmen to support our activities - without them there would be no Guard - and without the support of their employers they couldn't do it."

Does your employer support the National Guard and Reserve? Does he or she know how important your military duty is, and understand how military training helps with your civilian job? Has he or she signed a statement of support indicating an understanding of the importance of the Guard and Reserve in the total force? If the answer is "yes," then consider doing like Sergeant Hill and say "thank you" to your employer with an award nomination.

192D TAC CLINIC CONDUCTS EXERCISE

First it rained. Then the temperature dropped. The humidity made the cold feel like it went right through the clothes, "chilling the bone."

Instead of staying warm indoors, approximately 35 guardsmen from the 192d Tactical Clinic braved the elements March 3-4 to learn more about field medicine. Housed in tents and fed MREs, they spent the first day and a half listening to lectures on the deployed unit's mission and indiviudal roles during combat and natural disasters. A talk-through, walk-through mass casualty exercise was held to give members an idea of the various injuries and how to treat them. Finally, everyone was put to the test. Moulaged injuries provided "realism" as the medical staff explained their actions -- actions that would be vital in combat. Observers asked questions and provided tips as the clinic members examined the moulaged "injuries." "How would you turn this victim if he has a wound to the head?" "What priority would this one receive if she has received last rites from the chaplain?" "What if...what would you do?"

According to Lt. Col. (Dr.) James E. Jones, Jr., clinic commander, the objectives for the combat medical readiness training were to document participation in preparation for the upcoming health services readiness inspection; to further the individuals' medical knowledge and skills; and to train for the next operational readiness inspection.

192 TAC CLINIC UPDATE

ANG POLICY (IAW ANGR 160-02): "Female ANG personnel are qualified for and work in a variety of AFSCs. When pregnancy occurs, precautions should be taken to minimize risk factors that might adversely affect an otherwise normal pregnancy. Exposure to toxic chemicals or gases and ionizing radiation should be avoided. Routine immunizations should be discontinued for pregnant and lactating females. Situations which may induce hypoxia should also be avoided."

Females who think that they may be pregnant need to have pregnancy testing accomplished. If the pregnancy is confirmed, written confirmation from her physician must be provided to the Clinic (to update the and the person's Physical Profile Report) and the individual's supervisor must also be notified.

If the individual works in an industrial setting (e.g. NDI, munitions maintenance, POL, welding shops), the supervisor is required to submit a written request for a workplace evaluation to assess the working environment and physical activity required of the pregnant member.

Questions concerning the Air Force and the Air National Guard regulations/policies should be directed to the Clinic's Bioenvironmental Engineering Services at extension 556 during the week or Environmental Health at extension 567 during UTAs.

While these were immediate objectives, the training purpose went far beyond. "The clinic is one of those units that must be ready to deploy at all times," explained Col. (Dr.) David L. Hudson, State Headquarters air surgeon. "If the gun goes off, they will go with their unit. They must be able to carry their own weight because they will go."

"In fact, in some cases, the guard medical units will deploy ahead of the active duty forces," he added. "This is because the guard unit has a singular mission of readiness while the active duty forces have a dual mission -- that of providing medical services during peacetime and filling the mobility requirement as well."

The training also opened some eyes. As one observer noted, "It may look easy to load a patient on an ambulance, but in the field you may have to load several casualties onto one vehicle and suddenly you're lifting them at shoulder height or above. We soon learned it's not as easy as some of had imagined."

"This training allows us to isolate problems, to work in the field until it becomes second nature," Colonel Jones briefed Maj. Gen. John G. Castles, Virginia National Guard adjutant general, during the general's visit to the site. "It would not have been possible if it had not been for the expertise and help from the Army National Guard, members from Langley Air Force Base, the Civil Engineers, to name a few," the colonel noted. "It's been a very rewarding experience because of the type of help we've had."

MEAL CHIT PROCEDURES

When you use the meal chit you must ensure that the following procedures are followed. These steps are vital to continued administration of the meal-chit authorization program.

- a. Prior to paying for your meal you must instruct the cashier to make a cash register receipt for your meal only.
- b. You will then fill out the bottom portion of the meal chit with the exact amount of your meal. You are responsible for paying any excess cost over the authorized amount.

This procedure must be used because when more than on individual's meal is listed on the cash register receipt it is impossible to determine what part of the total receipt can be charged to the government. Both the meal chit and the cash register receipt are forwarded to the 192d TFG for review and processing for payment. The meal chits are funded, auditable documents that are inspected monthly.

We must have your individual cooperation to resolve problems with the documentation of pay records. Failure to follow the above will result in lost privileges.

COMMISSARY CARD EXPLAINED

Effective Jan. 1, 1990, there will be two separate means of identification required for unit members and their dependents, to be able to exercise commissary shopping benefits earned by attendance at unit training assemblies (UTAs).


Members will be required to show their Reserve Identification Card (DD Form 2, Red) and the Commissary Privilege Card (CPC); their dependents will be required to show their Reserve Dependent Card (AF Form 447) or a photo ID and the CPC.


Any unit member who is ordered to Active Duty, to include Active Duty for Training, is authorized to use military commissaries during the inclusive period of actual Active Duty.

Before entry into the commissary, unit members are required to present a valid DD form 2 (Red) and an official copy of Active Duty orders for the appropriate dates. Dependents are required to present a valid form of photo identification and a copy of the sponsor's Active Duty orders. The orders must contain sponsor's name, rank, SSAN, beginning and ending dates of active duty, and the name of the individual's primary dependent.

The Commissary Privilege Cards will be issued each year in the unit orderly rooms with an effective date of Jan. 1, and expiration date of Dec. 31. Cards cannot be laminated as the card will be stamped at each visit. If a card is lost the member must request replacement of the card in writing, to include circumstances of the loss. The cards will be controlled and accountable forms.

RUTA must be requested, approved and documented in advance of the missed period.
- 5. Equivalent Training (EQT) may be authorized by commanders for personal attendance problems if requested in advance. EQT with pay must be performed within 30 days of the missed UTA and within the same fiscal year. Only four EQT periods with pay are permitted each fiscal year. EQT without pay (retirement point only) may be authorized when the individual is unable to make an EQT in a pay status.
