

MOBILITY EXERCISE SET FOR MAY DRILL

A full-scale mobility exercise is on tap for the 192d TFG during May's UTA. The training event will necessitate the palletization and marshalling of all designated equipment, for simulated shipment on C-141/C-5 aircraft.

All members assigned to mobility work-center positions should report to those areas at 0815 on Saturday, May 5. Mobility reporting time on Sunday, May 6, is 0715. According to mobility NCOIC Master Sgt William Lund, the 2-day exercise will see the Mobility Control Center, Transportation Control Unit, Mobility Processing Unit, and all subordinate mobility workcenters in full operation.

Logistics NCOIC Master Sgt Don Clark said a concept briefing at 0830 on Saturday will provide key personnel additional information about the exercise scenario. The uniform of the day for all personnel for May's UTA will be fatigues or BDUs.

UNIT PREPARES FOR 'CANADIAN RED FLAG'

"Daytime temperatures will range from 50 to 60 degrees, dipping down at night into the mid-thirties. Since it's only the end of May, you might want to think twice before you take a dip in the lake, 'cause there's still some ice in there."

From May 26 through June 9, 1990, 72 people and 6 aircraft from the 192d TFG will participate in an exercise called Maple Flag, to be held at Cold Lake, Canada. The overall purpose of the exercise is to provide cooperative force training in an environment oriented more toward Europe, compared to the desert surroundings of Exercise Red Flag at Nellis AFB, NV.

Located near the small town of Grand Centre and four hours away from Edmonton, facilities at Cold Lake are limited and logistics lines are long. Housing is in short supply and the number of people who can participate in the exercise is restricted.

According to 149 TFS commander Lt Col Bill Jones, Maple Flag is "part of our continuing emphasis on participation in real world exercises. It's one more thing to put in our bag of tricks. It builds our experience base."

NOTES FROM THE PAST

From the desk of Lt. Col. Cecil Modlin VaANG State Headquarters

1975 - 192D TACTICAL FIGHTER GROUP

"The 192d TFG - status was downgraded by the Commander due to the pre-1961 model F-105s having been grounded for inspection and repair of wing stress cracks."

1964 - 192D TACTICAL FIGHTER GROUP

"On Friday, 17 Jul 64, an Eastern Air Lines DC-7B, landed short of the runway at approximately 1936, sheering the landing gear and slid through a ruptured wing tank. At this time, personnel of the VANG were working Friday nights to support flying training at the station. Approximately 17 VaANG personnel, with 4 pieces of fire fighting equipment, 1 ambulance with doctor, plus other support vehicles participated in fire fighting and rescue operations, aided 76 persons, including passengers and crew and extinguishing fire within 30 minutes of initial response. Five VaANG personnel remained and assisted EAL and FAA agencies until 11 p.m. For our assistance in this matter, the VaANG was commended by FAA, EAL and numerous passengers of this flight."

1953 - 149TH BOMBARDMENT SQ, LIGHT

"Following release from active duty, the 149th was reorganized in November 1953 and designated the 149th Bombardment Squadron, Light. Maj. William E. Haymes was named Commander. The primary aircraft was the B-26." (Note: General Haymes retired in 1981 after serving as the Assistant Adjutant General for Air)

1946 - COMMONWEALTH OF VIRGINIA

"In May of 1946 Maj. Gen. S. Gardner Waller, Adjutant General of Virginia, made formal application for assignment of Air National Guard units to Virginia." On 7 Jun 46, NGB notified Governor William M. Tuck that an ANG unit would be assigned to the State and Gen Waller appointed an organizing committee composed of outstanding Air Force Reserve Officers in the Richmond area to initiate the procurement of competent personnel for the unit. Colonel Ivor Massey headed this committee." (Note: Col. Massey, a local businessman, is still a strong supporter of the Virginia Air Guard)

- 5. Copy of State and/or National Membership Card.



AIRCRAFT CAN KILL

Numerous fatalities have occurred as a result of the accidental activation of aircraft ejection systems. The A-7 aircraft parked on the ramp, unless undergoing maintenance, have active ejection systems. It only takes the removal of a safety pin and the movement of a lever to eject the seat and canopy. For safety reasons, only personnel who have received the cockpit familiarization course are allowed to enter a cockpit.

One of the biggest concerns is for those individuals seen occasionally wandering around the flightline and poking around the aircraft without first informing Maintenance Control. It's important to have people interested in the unit and the aircraft, and members with visitors will be accommodated when possible. However, for their safety they must have approval from Maintenance Control (upstairs in the hangar), who will coordinate with the flightline before they enter the aircraft parking ramp.

Acceptance of gifts or favors may well result in criminal prosecutions.

Whenever a gratuity is delivered to you (e.g., left on your desk, front porch, or in your car), if you can return it - do so. If you cannot, turn it over to your supervisor along with the name of the person you believe has given it to you. Play it safe - and - be safe. Whenever you are in doubt, call the contracting office or consult the base legal officer. **Thank You - BUT - No Thank You**"

FROM CBPO: IN CASE OF AN EMERGENCY...

How serious do you take your DD Form 93, Record of Emergency Data? This form is perhaps the most important document in your Personnel Records folder! According to Air Force regulation, your DD Form 93 serves as an official document for designating beneficiaries for death gratuity pay, as well as unpaid pay and allowances. It is part of each guardsman's mobility processing folder.

Most guard members try conscientiously to keep their DD Form 93 current. But some are a bit lax. It is the latter group that most concerns Master Sgt. Les Hart, NCOIC of Customer Assistance and Officer/Airman Records. According to Master Sgt. Hart, "the greatest concern I have is to have even only one guardsman become a fatality and we find out their DD Form 93 is not current for one reason or another...one can imagine the nightmare as to the legal ramifications. This is very serious business and most embarrassing if one's "ducks" are not in order."

At the present time, CBPO is reaccomplishing DD Forms 93 due either to administrative reasons or the member's request to change something. When CBPO calls a unit to request a member to report to review and sign the emergency form, the member should make it a top priority to ensure this responsibility is completed the same UTA weekend. Everyone's time is valuable; but looking out for your family's welfare in case of an emergency is equally important.

- 2. AM Assemblies will be 0800-1200 (Sat) 0700-1100 (Sun) and PM Assemblies will be 1300-1700 (Sat) 1200-1600 (Sun), with the following exceptions: Assembly for one flight of Food Services Personnel will be as follows:

 AM 0630-1030 (Sat) 0530-0930 (Sun), PM 1100-1530 (Sat) 1000-1430 (Sun). Additional duty hours to cover special work requirements such as pre-flight, post-flight, etc, will be scheduled by each unit as required. Each UTA will be no less than four hours duration excluding lunch periods.
- 3. Uniform will be lightweight blues or fatigues, as directed.
- 4. Commanders may utilize Rescheduled Unit Training Assemblies (RUTAs) to achieve training objectives using maximum availability of equipment and full-time personnel resources that cannot be achieved during UTAs and SUTAs. RUTA must be requested, approved and documented in advance of the missed period.
- 5. Equivalent Training (EQT) may be authorized by commanders for personal attendance problems if requested in advance. EQT with pay must be performed within 30 days of the missed UTA and within the same fiscal year. Only four EQT periods with pay are permitted each fiscal year. EQT without pay (retirement point only) may be authorized when the individual is unable to make an EQT in a pay status.
