June 14 is Flag Day, a time to celebrate the birthday of the Stars and Stripes: June 14, 1777. On that day, Congress adopted the first official flag to symbolize the United States of America.

The flag we honor and under which we serve, said President Woodrow Wilson in a 1917 Flag Day address, "is the emblem of our unity, our power, our thought and purpose as a nation. ... It speaks to us of

the past, of the men and women who went before us and of the records they wrote upon it."

Historians long have argued about whether the colors of the U.S. flag convey specific meanings. Charles Thomson, secretary of the Continental Congress, believed so. One story has it that while Thomson addressed Congress about the Seal of the United States, he stated that white signifies purity and innocence; red, hardiness and valor; and blue, vigilance, perseverance and justice.

The "Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag" was first used in public schools in celebration of Columbus Day, Oct. 12, 1892. Its author is unknown; however, it first appeared in The Youth's Companion magazine in Boston in 1892. It received official congressional approval on June 22, 1942.


The phrase "under God" was added by a congressional act on June 14, 1954. At that time, President Dwight D. Eisenhower said, "In this way we are reaffirming the transcendence of religious faith in America's heritage and future. In this way we shall constantly strengthen those spiritual weapons which forever will be our country's most powerful resource in peace and war."

### COMMANDER'S CALL

MILESTONES.....The end of June will mark a major milestone in the history of the 192d Fighter Group—completion of our conversion phase to the F-16 aircraft. When the first two jets arrived almost a year ago, with "VIRGINIA" beautifully stenciled on the tail, 30 June 1992 seemed a long way off. (The conversion officially started on 1 October 1991.) Looking back, the tireless efforts of a lot of people have brought us to the point of being able to report that we are sufficiently trained and equipped to support our wartime tasking. That time has passed quickly.

By comparison, transition to the F-16 is taking three months longer to complete than our transition to the A-7. Ten years ago, there was a great push to get back to combat ready status as soon as possible. Today, we are taking a more measured pace toward our combat ready goals. (Some would say that nine months is not long enough.) Overall, safety is enhanced and the emphasis now is on quality training and maybe not so much on quantity (or rapidity). Not that our conversion to the A-7 was unsafe, but with changing technology and more complex systems, the current approach is certainly appropriate for the



F-16. Many of the lessons learned in our A-7 conversion were put to work to ensure a safe and efficient transition to the F-16.

Earlier I stated that we will be <u>sufficiently</u> trained by the end of June. The next goal is to become <u>FULLY</u> trained and equipped by the end of 1992. Limited (and reduced) budgets pose a large challenge to even modest goals. We recently reduced our flying hour allocation—the second reduction this fiscal year. Many questions remain about future funding for projects and equipment. I can't see around the corner, but I have always been impressed with how well the Virginia Air National Guard responds to challenges. To make it work, each member must be a part of the team. Every job is important. We must all pull in the same direction. I'm counting on <u>US</u>.

Words are cheap. I intend to watch and be a part of the action. I'm willing to bet that in six months, we will have achieved our next milestone—and the time will have passed quickly.

# Officer Commissioning Changes

Effective October 1, 1993: Unit members interested in pursuing a commission must have a minimum of 75 semester or 112 quarter hours of college credit to qualify for a degree waiver. A bachelor's degree must be obtained by the sixth year of commissioned service.

Effective October 1, 1995: To be eligible for a degree waiver, applicants must have completed a minimum of 90 semester or 135 quarter hours, with a bachelor's degree by the fifth year of commissioned service. In addition to the education requirements indicated above, testing on the Air Force Officers Qualifying Test will only be authorized twice (the initial test and one retest).

# Looking Ahead... Make Your Fourth of July Happy, Safe

The fourth of July is a special time for military members. Keep the holiday special by minding safety, especially fireworks safety. Whether you are supervised or on your own, experts suggest the following guidelines:

- \* Store fireworks in a cool, dry place.
- \*Don't allow children to play with fireworks; sparklers, considered by many adults to be "safe" fireworks, burn at temperatures up to 1,800 degrees Fahrenheit and can easily ignite clothing.
- \* Closely supervise older children when they use fireworks.
- \*Don't allow running or horseplay around fireworks.
- \* Read and follow warning instructions on the fireworks label.
- \* Light fireworks outdoors in a clear area away from buildings.
- \* Make sure people and pets are out of range before lighting fireworks.
- \* Keep a bucket of water nearby for emergencies.
- \* Never light fireworks in a container, especially one of glass or metal.
- \* Don't try to relight malfunctioning fireworks; soak them in water and throw them away.

## **Reserve Reductions**

(Air Force Internal Information Service)

A Pentagon plan that will pace National Guard and Reserve personnel cuts with active-duty reductions is facing strong opposition in Congress.

The plan calls for closing down units in all 50 states, the District of Colombia and Puerto Rico; cutting defense spending; and reducing the size of both the active and reserve forces by 25 percent over the next five years.

Nearly 80 percent of the 830 units on the list presented to Congress were part of forces specifically intended to go to Europe in wartime and support active-duty units. By 1997, the new base force will consist of 1,626,000 active-duty and 1,164,142 reserve component personnel.
