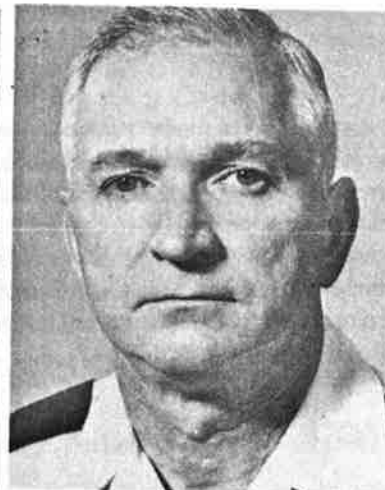

“SMALLER BUT TOUGHER” AIR FORCE

Earlier this year, Gen. Merrill A. McPeak, Air Force Chief of Staff, spoke to a group of individuals attending an Air Force Association (AFA) symposium. Part of his speech is reprinted in this article. In Commander's Call this month, Lt. Col. Bill Campenni, 192d TFG Deputy Commander for Operations, comments on the impact of Air Force restructuring

on the ANG overall, and on the 192d TFG in particular.

General McPeak: "When the war ended (Desert Storm), we turned to the problem of ensuring that

To Your Good Health

High-risk behaviors, not people, spread AIDS

High-risk behaviors spread AIDS not high-risk people.

That is the consensus of doctors at Wilford Hall Medical Center at Lackland AFB, Texas, who oversee the Human Immunodeficiency Virus program of the Air Force. HIV is the prelude to Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome. Carriers may be infected with HIV for five to 10 years before the virus becomes full-blown AIDS, at which point a person's immune system is totally depleted.

"Clearly, HIV infection and the risk of acquiring it needs to be considered a behavioral-based risk," said Maj. (Dr.) Greg Melcher, chief of the infectious diseases services and consultant to the surgeon general for infectious diseases for the Air Force. "Do you engage in a particularly high-risk behavior as opposed to belonging to a high-risk group?"

High-risk behaviors include promiscuity, unprotected vaginal, anal or oral sex, and intravenous needle-sharing with people whose HIV status is either positive or unknown.

When condoms are used during sexual contact, the risk is somewhat lowered, but even so, protected intercourse with multiple partners is risky. Sexually active people who are not in a monogamous, years-long relationship are at risk.

Originally identified as a "gay disease," the incidence rate of contracting HIV by homosexual males has lowered, Melcher said, indicating these people have modified their behavior.



But the rate of heterosexual transmission is increasing. Every year the risk of becoming infected from an unprotected sexual contact is much greater as AIDS spreads from gay men and IV drug users to sexual partners of heterosexual drug abusers and then to other heterosexual sexual partners who are not drug abusers.

Moreover, the ratio of infected persons - male to female - is going down. That was not generally true five to six years ago; many more men were infected than women. This suggests that a new wave of heterosexually-transmitted diseases is clearly arriving.

Until a vaccine of some sort is developed, the only way to stop the spread of the disease is for all people to take responsibility for their behaviors.

Everybody can take action to prevent their own infection. With the exception of very rare blood transfusion transmission and perinatal transmission, this disease is preventable.

OFFICER APPLICATIONS BEING ACCEPTED

The CBPO is currently accepting applications from individuals who are interested in obtaining a commission in the VaANG. The Hq, VaANG policy for filling vacant non-rated/non-professional positions within the state is that a pool of applicants be established at the beginning of each fiscal year (1 October).

The pool will consist of 6 individuals selected from all applications received, and meet the necessary qualification requirements. Individuals who are placed in the pool are reminded that should they not be selected for a vacant position during the year, they must reapply the following year. They are not automatically retained in the pool at the beginning of the new fiscal year. Some of the basic requirements for a commission are as follows:

1. AGE: Individual must be commissioned by age 35. Absolutely no age waivers will be considered.
2. EDUCATION: A bachelor's degree is desired. Waivers of education will be considered.

Requirements for a waiver will be explained to you in detail by a CBPO representative.

3. TEST REQUIREMENTS: All applicants must take the Air Force Officer Qualifying Test. If you have previously tested, your test scores cannot be more than 2 years old. If so, you must retest. Please contact the CBPO immediately to schedule a time. Required qualifying score requirements will be explained by a CBPO representative.

Deadline for submission of application is 9 June 1992. Applications received after that date will not be considered. If applicants qualify on the AFOQT, this folder will be put before the selection board for review. Failure to furnish the required information within the specified date will result in the application not being considered.

AM assemblies will be 0800-1200 (Sat) 0700-1100 (Sun) and PM assemblies will be 1300-1700 (Sat) 1200-1600 (Sun), with the following exceptions: Assembly for one flight of Food Services Personnel: AM 0630-1030 (Sat) 0530-0930 (Sun), PM 1100-1530 (Sat) 1000-1430 (Sun). Additional duty hours to cover special work requirements such as pre-flight, post-flight, etc. will be scheduled by each unit as required. Each UTA will be no less than four hours duration excluding lunch periods.

3. Uniform will be lightweight blues or fatigues, as directed.

4. Commanders may utilize RUTAs to achieve training objectives using maximum availability of equipment and full-time personnel resources that cannot be achieved during UTAs and SUTAs. A RUTA must be requested, approved and documented in advance of the missed period.

5. Equivalent Training (EQT) may be authorized by commanders for personal attendance problems if requested in advance. EQT with pay must be performed within 30 days of the missed UTA and within the same fiscal year. EQT without pay (retirement points only) may be authorized when the individual is unable to make an EQT in pay status.

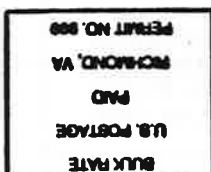
