The mobility exercise originally scheduled for the December 1993 UTA has been rescheduled for the FIRST UTA of February 1994.

AIR GUARD READY FOR IRAQ 'HOLIDAY' MISSION

The Virginia Air National Guard earned local, state, and national news coverage in November when it announced it will send three of its F-16s to patrol the no-fly zone over Iraq during the upcoming holiday season.

In all, 47 volunteers from the 192d Fighter Group will be part of the history-making deployment. As announced on the front page of the Richmond Times-Dispatch, "It will be the first time in the post-Cold War era that the U.S. military uses a National Guard unit for peacekeeping." The 45-day deployment was scheduled to begin in early December.

LET'S TALK 35-10

The Air Force equivalent to the business suit is our service dress. Let's cover some of the trouble spots in properly wearing the service dress, both for men and women.

Men's Service Dress

Coat and trousers must be of matching shade and material.

The silver tip of the **belt** extends beyond the buckle facing the wearer's left, but no blue fabric shows. (Brass on brass.)

The finish of **badges and U.S. insignia** may be of satin or highly polished, but the finish of all of them must match.

Name tags and ribbons must be centered on and rest on the top edge of the wearer's right and left pockets, respectively, but not over the top edge.

Center enlisted 4" chevrons halfway between shoulder seam and elbow when elbow is bent at 90degree angle. Center regular size officer grade insignia 5/8 inch from end of the epaulets.

Women's Service Dress

U.S. Insignia: Semibox coat: Centered with bottom of U.S. horizontal with the ground.

Blazer coat: place U.S. halfway up the seam resting on but not over it; bottom of US horizontal with the ground.

Name tag: Semibox coat: Centered on right side between lapel and arm seam, 2" to 2 1/2" higher than top button.

Blazer Coat: Centered on right side between lapel and arm seam, I to 2" higher than top button.

Ribbons: Both coats: Centered on left side like name tag and even with bottom of name tag.

Chevrons: Center 3" or 4" chevrons halfway between shoulder seam and elbow when elbow is bent 90 degrees.

SAFE WINTER DRIVING TIPS

When winter weather hits, it's too late to start thinking about winterizing a vehicle.

Take steps to prepare for the onslaught of bad weather while the weather is still good. If you wait too long, you may find yourself literally stuck in an early season storm.

A winter driving kit, kept in the vehicle, could mean the difference between life and death. At a minimum, the kit should include a shovel, whisk broom, ice scraper, flashlight with new batteries, booster cables, warning devices like flares or triangles, tire chains and a bag of kitty litter or sand for traction. There should also be a first aid kit, paper or cloth towels, a blanket and traction mats.

Other recommended items include warm clothes, fire extinguisher, properly inflated spare tire and nonperishable snacks. Have a set of tools and extras of the parts that might fail which can be easily replaced, like wiper blades, spark plugs and fuses.

Make sure your car is ready for the winter weather. Among things to do: get a tune-up, check all lights and make sure the heater and defroster work and there's plenty of antifreeze. Check windshield wipers and have the brakes properly adjusted. Keep your tires in good shape and properly inflated for safer winter driving.

Allow at least an extra eight seconds driving distance between vehicles on icy, slippery roads and focus your attention farther down the road than you normally would, at least 20 seconds or more. Remember that when road conditions change, braking requirements do, too.

Always wear seat belts and drive a little slower. Clean off all ice and snow from the car's lights, windows, mirrors, hood, trunk and roof before starting, and keep it off, as much as you can, while driving. Avoid using the parking brake in cold, snowy and wet weather; don't warm up the vehicle in an enclosed area (like a garage); and keep the gas tank at least half full to avoid gas line freeze-ups.

(Wind speeds greater than 40 mph have little additional chilling effect.)

How Cold is Cold? Both temperature and wind affect the heat loss from the surface of the body. The effect of these two factors is expressed as an "equivalent temperature," which approximates the still air temperature which would have the same cooling effect as the wind and temperature combination. For example, from the table above, with a temperature of 20°F, and a wind of 20 mph the effect on exposed flesh is the same as—9°F with no will.


ENLISTED ASSOCIATION SEEKS MEMBERS, SUPPORT

alternatives are just a few topics the experts address during the holiday season.






UNIT SUPPORTS BLOOD DRIVE

AM assemblies will be 0800-1200 (Sat) 0700-1100 (Sun) and PM assemblies will be 1300-1700 (Sat) 1200-1600 (Sun), with the following exceptions: Assembly for one flight of Food Services Personnel: AM 0630-1030 (Sat) 0530-0930 (Sun), PM 1100-1530 (Sat) 1000-1430 (Sun). Additional duty hours to cover special work requirements such as pre-flight, post-flight, etc. will be scheduled by each unit as required. Each UTA will be no less than four hours duration excluding lunch periods.
 - 3. Uniform will be lightweight blues or BDUs, as directed.
- 4. Commanders may utilize RUTAs to achieve training objectives using maximum availability of equipment and full-time personnel resources that cannot be achieved during UTAs and SUTAs. A RUTA must be requested, approved and documented in advance of the missed period.
- 5. Equivalent Training (EQT) may be authorized by commanders for personal attendance problems if requested in advance. EQT with pay must be performed within 30 days of the missed UTA and within the same fiscal year. EQT without pay (retirement points only) may be authorized when the individual is unable to make an EQT in pay status.
