

PISTOL TEAM 'STRIKES' AGAIN

During October 5 through 16, the 192d FG pistol team competed in the Winston P. Wilson National Guard Championship matches at Camp Joseph T. Robinson, North Little Rock, Arkansas. Participants in this annual event, sponsored by the National Guard Marksmanship Training Unit at Camp Robinson, are winners of state championships from all 50 states.

The 192 FG team, which has represented Virginia at this match more than any other unit in the Virginia National Guard, had its best finish to date, coming in with an overall 9th place finish. Individual awards were won by Staff Sgt. Krag-Stevens Cash, Staff Sgt. James Breeden, and Tech. Sgt. Philip Thomas.

VA HOME LOANS: President Bush signed into law Oct 28, the Veterans Home Loan Program Amendments of 1992. The law, which took effect immediately has some interesting provisions for Selected Reserve members.

The law opens VA loans through 1999 to current members with six or more years service, and to veterans of the Selected Reserve who served at least six years and have an honorable discharge.

Reservists and Guard members who participate must pay a 2 percent funding fee to the VA for no down payment home loans.

It also makes veterans free to negotiate the interest rate for a VA backed mortgage with the lender, negotiate the number of any additional interest rate points the lender charges for making the loan, and negotiate how many points will be paid by the buyer or seller.

RINGSTAFF NAMED UNIT CAREER ADVISOR OF THE YEAR

Master Sgt Gary S. Ringstaff, assigned to the 192d Civil Engineering Squadron has been selected as the Virginia Air National Guard Unit Career Advisor of the year for 1992.





Preventive Law

Recent changes in the Serviceman's Group Life Insurance (SGLI) program allow military members the option of increasing their insurance coverage up to a maximum of \$200,000.

All members of the Virginia Air National Guard should also take this time to review their overall arrangements for the welfare of family members in the event of their death. This is a subject most of us prefer to not think about, but proper planning could prove critical to the well-being of the people you love most.

A "last will and testament" is an important



part of estate planning; it not only states who will receive your property, but also names your executor -- the person who will be responsible for handling all of your personal and legal affairs. For parents of minor children, a will also allows you to appoint a guardian to take care of them and their property until adulthood.

The legal office provides advice to unit members on personal legal matters, including the preparation of wills and powers-of-attorney. Individuals in need of legal services during the UTA weekend should contact the legal office in Room 10, O&T Building, extension 6494.

AM assemblies will be 0800-1200 (Sat) 0700-1100 (Sun) and PM assemblies will be 1300-1700 (Sat) 1200-1600 (Sun), with the following exceptions: Assembly for one flight of Food Services Personnel: AM 0630-1030 (Sat) 0530-0930 (Sun), PM 1100-1530 (Sat) 1000-1430 (Sun). Additional duty hours to cover special work requirements such as pre-flight, post-flight, etc. will be scheduled by each unit as required. Each UTA will be no less than four hours duration excluding lunch periods.
 - 3. Uniform will be lightweight blues or BDUs, as directed.
- 4. Commanders may utilize RUTAs to achieve training objectives using maximum availability of equipment and full-time personnel resources that cannot be achieved during UTAs and SUTAs. A RUTA must be requested, approved and documented in advance of the missed period.
- 5. Equivalent Training (EQT) may be authorized by commanders for personal attendance problems if requested in advance. EQT with pay must be performed within 30 days of the missed UTA and within the same fiscal year. EQT without pay (retirement points only) may be authorized when the individual is unable to make an EQT in pay status.
