MEMORIAL DAY MESSAGE FROM THE SECRETARY OF DEFENSE

Every year on Memorial Day, we pause to remember those brave soldiers, sailors, airmen and Marines who gave their lives in defense of our nation, our ideals and our way of life.

From the hills of Valley Forge to the shores of Omaha Beach to the streets of Mogadishu and Port-au-Prince, hundreds of thousands of American servicemen and women have made the ultimate sacrifice for the cause of freedom and justice.

Here at home and around the world, rows of white stone markers stand in silent testimony to the determination to defend America. The sacrifices of these men and women serve as a constant reminder that freedom isn't free at all; it comes at a very high price, but thankfully, one

Commander's Call

Memorial Day. This holiday dates from the Civil War when women's groups began to decorate soldier's graves with flowers. It should be noted that it didn't matter if the soldiers fought for the north or the south. They all were honored with this simple ceremony.

Today, Memorial Day is set aside as a national holiday to recognize and honor the men and women who died in the service of our nation. It's a special day to remember the sacrifice of those who went before us.

In November 1981 (yes, 1981!) I cut out a newspaper article (a small chart, actually) titled "America's War Dead." Obviously the chart is out of date and pretty battered, but I keep it in my desk and occasionally review the figures in an attempt to maintain some perspective of the horrible nature of war.

For example, we lost 622,511 people during the Civil War (1861-1865). The next highest total was 405,399 from World War II (1941-1946). Barely 20 years before the Second World War, World War I (1917-1918) claimed 116,516 lives. And that was supposed to be the "war to end all wars!" Losses from the Vietnam War (1964-1973) are very personal to me and total 57,685.

I didn't round off any of the numbers, because each number represents a person--like you and me.

Many had families. All belonged to the military family. Col Denny Neisen, Director of Safety for the National Guard Bureau, recently counted the number of family members directly affected by a motor vehicle fatality. His count of 42 does not consider friends, co-workers and others who are also affected. Obviously the impact goes well beyond the individual casualty. It's all very sobering.

My letter today is not meant to be depressing, but I want to emphasize the importance of Memorial Day. Please take time to reflect on our heritage and decide for yourself what this holiday means to you. Thanks for reading.

INCENTIVE FLIGHT

Staff Sgt. Terry Long of the 192d Security Police Flight recently took his maiden flight in an F-16. As part of the 192FG's "incentive flight" program, Sergeant Long was given a ride in an F-16D flown by Lieutenant Colonel Don Everett during the Saturday UTA in April. He was selected for the flight from among candidates basewide. Sergeant Long, 30, is a Colonial Heights police officer in civilian life. He has been in the 192FG for about 10 years.



OFFICER APPLICATIONS BEING ACCEPTED

The Military Personnel Flight (MPF) is currently accepting applications from individuals who are interested in obtaining a commission in the VaANG. The Hq, VaANG policy for filling vacant non-rated/non-professional positions within the state is that a pool of applicants be established at the beginning of each fiscal year (1 October).

The pool will consist of qualified applicants. Individuals who are not selected for a vacant position during the year must reapply the following year. They are not automatically retained in the pool. Some requirements for a commission are:

- 1. AGE: Individual must be commissioned by age 35. Absolutely no age waivers will be considered.
- 2. EDUCATION: A Bachelor's degree is desired. Waivers of education will be considered. You must have a minimum of 90 semester hours for consideration of a waiver.
- 3. TEST REQUIREMENTS: All applicants must take the Air Force Qualification Test

Applications received after 4 June 1995 will not be considered. Interested individuals should contact Master Sergeant Rollings, of the MPF, Ext. 6708.

USAF SENIOR NCO ACADEMY APPLICANTS

The USAF Senior Noncommissioned Officer Academy (SRNCOA) is the highest level of Air Force enlisted professional military education (PME). The mission of the academy is to conduct a program of PME to prepare selected Senior NCOs to better fulfill their leadership and management responsibilities.

Commanders are requested to nominate their most professional Senior NCOs. Senior NCOs from all MAJCOMs, the Air National Guard (ANG), and the Air Force Reserve are selected to attend the Academy. Applicants should apply for the SRNCOA as soon as possible to ensure a quota for FY 95 schedule. Class dates are as follows:

96A 23 Oct 95 - 13 Dec 95

96B 08 Jan 96 - 28 Feb 96

96C 13 Mar 96 - 01 May 96

96D 28 May 96 - 17 Jul 96

96E 13 Aug 96 - 02 Oct 96

To be eligible to attend the SRNCOA, the following criteria must be met:

- 1. Be in the grade of E-7 or E-8 (E-7 must have at least 24 months time-in grade (TIG); applicant clearly demonstrates a potential for increased leadership and management responsibility and has completed an in-residence NCO Academy or Leadership School (this is an important selection factor).
- 2. Have as least one year retainability from graduation date.
- 3. Hold a Secret or Top Secret security clearance.
- 4. Be within body fat limits outlined in AFI 40-502.
- 5. Be recommended by the immediate commander.

192nd law enforcement squad, and 40 will be from the unit's Security Police Flight, and the remaining six will come from the 113th Security Police Squadron from the District of Columbia (D.C.).

According to 1Lt. Eliot Evans, commander, 192d Security Police Squadron, the training will qualify those trained for worldwide mobility in a new area of operations -- air-base defense. Previously, the 192d SPS's focus had been on



THE COMPANY CAR'

From time to time workers in the 192d's Vehicle Operations section are questioned as to what constitutes proper use of a government vehicle. The answer is simple: Government vehicles are obtained for the purpose of conducting official business only; the use of a government vehicle is not authorized for personal business, personal convenience, or pleasure.

Because of their markings and colors, military vehicles are highly visible and distinctive. As such, their appearance and the manner in which they are used significantly influences public perception of the Air National Guard's management of resources. The vehicle operator is responsible for the operation and care of the vehicle, as well as the purposes for which it is used. Supervisors, commanders, and unit vehicle control officers should routinely stress the concept of personal responsibility with regard to the use of government vehicles.

CHANGES AFFECT SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

During the Executive Council of the Officers Association meeting in February, several new goals and ideas were presented by the long range planning committee. After lengthy debate, the following changes to the association's scholarship program were approved by the council:

The Council endorsed the establishment of a self-sustaining scholarship program as part of the existing Virginia National Guard Foundation. The idea is to provide for a self-sustaining scholarship program which can be fed by tax deductible donations as well as through the Combined Federal Campaign, and Air Force Association Fund.

The Council also approved donating a percentage of the annual budgeted scholarship funds to the VNG Foundation. This will help foster the growth of the VNGF scholarship program so that it can become self-sustaining sooner.

Lastly, due to the reduced revenue generated by the association and the amount allocated to the scholarship program, scholarships will only be offered to officers, warrant officers, and their dependents. Enlisted personnel will only be allowed to apply for the association's scholarships if they are dependent of the officers stated above.
