

Summer finds 192d FW deployed

This summer, members of the 192d Fighter Wing will be deployed across the country and around the world.

Deployment activities kicked off in earnest on May 28, with nearly 80 unit members deploying to Aviano AB, Italy. All total, nearly 100 unit members are currently at Aviano.

The unit is flying reconnaissance missions over the strife-torn land formerly known as Yugoslavia. The 192d will continue flying recce missions out of Aviano unitI mid-July. Due to the size and nature of the deployment, it was divided into two 3-week rotations. The first and second groups will change places between

23. The second group is scheduled to return to the base July 17. Col. Bill Jones, 192d FW commander is detachment commander during the first rotation. LtCol Dave Dornan, 149th Fighter Squadron, will serve as detachment commander during the second rotation.

June 21-

The 192d Security Police head for Ramstein AB, Germany, on June 15 and will return home

June 30. The contingent of 49 security police, law enforcement, and combat arms and training and maintenance team members will be providing backfill support to the 86th Security Police Squadron.

The 86th is the largest security police force in USAFE (U.S. Air Forces in Europe). The 86th has been very busy supporting operations throughout Europe The 192d will backfill positions

for the unit while many members are deployed to an exercise in s o u t h e r n Germany.

Meanwhile, June 15, the 192d Medical Squadron deploys to

Misawa AB, Japan. Nearly 50 squadron members will participate in the 14-day deployment. The doctors, nurses, technicians and administrative staff will be working at the Misawa AB Hospital, which serves the entire Air Force population in the Pacific Region.

Officer applications due now

The Military Personnel Flight is accepting applications from individuals who are interested in obtaining a commission in the VaANG. The policy for filling vacant, non-rated/non-professional positions within the state is to have a pool of applicants established at the beginning of each fiscal year (Oct. 1)

The pool consists of individuals selected from all applications received, who meet all qualification requirements. People placed in the pool are reminded that should they not be selected for a vacant position during the year, they must reapply the following year. The applications are not automatically retained in the pool at the beginning of the new fiscal year. Some of the basic requirements for a commission are as follows:

ATM Suggestion Response

At the January 1996 Commander's Advisory Council meeting, the idea of installing an automatic teller machine on base was raised.

While many considered it a good idea, base officials researching ATM possibilities found out it was not feasible for the base.

Local banks and the Ft. Eustis Federal Credit Union said that 50,000 transactions per month are required in order to have an ATM installed. The base cannot meet this criteria.

Ft. Eustis Federal Credit Union pointed out that its members will not be charged for ATM transactions from the Richmond area if they send the FEFCU a request for a fee waiver. This fee waiver request must only be done once.

Individuals must be commissioned by age 35. Absolutely no age waivers will be considered.

A bachelor's degree is desired; however, education waivers will be considered. Applicants must have a minimum of 90 semester hours for a waiver to be considered.

All applicants must take the Air Force Officer Qualification Test (AFOQT). If you have previously tested and qualified, your test scores will not expire. Required qualifying score requirements will be explained by an MPF staff member.

The deadline for submitting applications is Sunday, June 9. Applications received after that date will not be considered. Applicants failing to furnish the required information will not be considered.

The 192d Fighter Wing has achieved a higher level of visibility and renown since embarking upon the Air Force's new F-16 reconnaissance mission.


Interest in our unit extends right up through the the Air Force Chief of Staff, Gen. Ronald Fogleman to members of the U.S. Congress.

Guards secure base resources

There is a group of people serving the Va ANG every day that often goes unrecognized. Most people think of them as "the gateguards," but this team of people is responsible for much more.

Meet one of our gate security officers: Rodger Jones. He served in the active duty Air Force for 20 years, and retired from the 842d Missile Security Sqdn, Grand Forks, N.D. in September 1991. "I enjoy working for the Va Air Guard. Coming to this job was like coming home," he said.

Gate Security is the first contact people have with the base. The Guards must be firm yet courteous and ready to deal with any type of situation that could present itself. Jones manages gate security with eight other full-time and three part-time employees. He said, "Our job can be routine much of the time, but we never lose sight of the fact that we are here to protect the base's resources. Even in times of peace, real-world situations have shown that targets can be anywhere. We have to stay prepared and vigilant."

Jones says most people on base are security conscious, but he reminds us: "Security is everyone's business, not just the guys at the gate."

Fire Dept. offers summer safety tips

It's time to break out the lawn mowers and power tools. Here are a few timely safety tips to help you have a safer summer.

Before plugging in any power tool, check the electrical cord for cuts, breaks or abrasions. If they are in bad shape, replace them.

When getting out gasoline-powered tools, check for dry, rotting fuel lines and pull cords. Replace worn parts.

Keep only a small amount of gasoline on hand for your lawn equipment. This fuel should be stored in an approved container and kept in an



outside storage area. Portable fuel cans should be painted red and have the word "gasoline" printed on them. The can should also have a tight fitting vent cap or a spring lid. Plastic or glass containers should not be used to store or carry gas, unless the container has been approved by Underwriters Laboratory.

When transporting gasoline, never leave it in your vehicle for an extended amount of time, especially on hot days. The container may rupture due to pressure buildup, or fill the vehicle with explosive vapors.

Never open gasoline cans near open flames or sparking devices. The vapors are dangerous and explosive. Make sure your lawn mower engine is shut down and cool before refueling. Maintain a 20 ft clearance from all combustible materials and structures when refueling. Never refuel anything inside a building

Brashear spoke eloquently of the many trials and tribulations he faced during his distinguished career, during which he accomplished many "firsts." Jones, 192d Fighter Wing commander, described Brashear as a true hero.

Their first visit was about three months ago, just before Christmas.





everyone to join them at Club 149 on Saturday, July 13.


