192d Propulsion repairs 100th engine

With speed and precision, the 192d Propulsion Section recently completed overhaul maintenance on its 100th General Electric F110-100 engine, since becoming an Engine Regional Repair Center (ERRC). Brigadier Gen. Wilbur Rose, VaANG deputy adjutant general for air, was on hand to congratulate SMSgt Ray Bassetti and the members of the propulsion branch on a phenomenal job.

During January 1995, the 192d became a test site for the ERRC. Outstanding results during the test period led the 192d to become an officials ERRC Oct. 1, 1995. "The numbers have been staggering," said the commander of the 23rd Logistics Support at Pope AFB, N.C. "From Jan. 1, 1995, to Feb. 29, 1996, DoD had a total

Gen. Hawley takes reins of ACC

General Richard E. Hawley took the reins of Air Combat Command April 5.

The general succeeds Gen. Joseph W. Ralston who became vice chairman of the Joint chiefs of Staff March 1.

As ACC's commander, Hawley is responsible for more than 1,630 aircraft and 132,600 active duty military and civilian people at 32 major installations in the United States, Panama, Iceland and Portugal. ACC also trains and equips almost 100,000 Air National Guardsman and Air Reservists in 85 combat wings and squadrons in the U.S. and Panama. If the 192d Fighter Wing were activated, it would be an ACC asset.

The command provides nuclear forces for the U.S. Strategic Command, theater airlift forces for the United States Atlantic, Central, Southern, European and Pacific Commands, and defense forces for the North American Aerospace Defense Command.

Before accepting the helm of ACC, located at Langley AFB, Va., the general served as commander, U.S. Air forces in Europe and Allied Air Forces Central Europe.


AF moves up new chevron wear date

The Air Force has moved up the mandatory wear date for the new enlisted chevron from Oct. 1, 1999, to Oct. 1, 1997.

The original date coincided with the mandatory wear date of the new uniform. But

since sales of the old chevron have tapered off, AirForce Chief of Staff Gen. Ronald R. Fogleman agreed to accelerate the new chevron wear date by two years, said personnel officials in Washington, D.C.

People promoted during this year's promotion cycles should be able to get the new chevrons through their unit supply system, according to Air Force officials. The new stripes are also available at Military Clothing Sales stores.



Air Force clarifies military relationships

The Air Force has revised the Air Force Instruction governing professional and unprofessional relationships, personnel officials in Washington, D.C. recently said.

The revision of AFI 36-2909, Professional and Unprofessional Relationships, was prompted because too much of the policy explanation was removed during the process of converting the document from a regulation to an instruction, officials said.

The AFI, and this subsequent revision, don't represent a change in policy, but the revision does clarify the custom and the standards of conduct for maintaining professional relationships in the Air Force.



Computer anti-virus software available

The Department of Defense recently extended its license for IBMAV (IBM AntiVirus) software through Sept. 30, 1996. This DoD-wide anti-virus software may be loaded onto any personal computer at work or in the home of any DoD personnel. (This includes the IBM-compatible PC you own at home.)

The software does not have to be removed from your computer system at the close of the contract. However, unless the government contract is renewed, monthly software updates will not continue after the contract close-out date.

All DoD personnel may now plan, install, and configure their networks knowing they can use the IBM AntiVirus product long term. At the 192d FW, this product is available on the local area network (LAN) at Y:\IBMAV> and can be downloaded to your personal disks (you'll need



two diskettes). To install this program on your computer, follow the instructions found in the INSTALL.TXT file on disk #1.

Apply now for Senior NCO Academy

The USAF Senior Noncommissioned Officer Academy (SRNCOA) is the highest level of Air Force enlisted professional military education (PME). The mission of the academy is to conduct a program of PME to prepare selected senior NCOs to better fulfili their leadership and management responsibilities.

Commanders are requested to nominate their most professional senior NCOs for this program. Attendees come from all major commands, the Air National Guard, and the Air Force Reserve. Applicants should apply for SRNCOA as soon as possible to ensure their desired class date for the fiscal year 97 schedule. Class dates are as follows:

Class 96A 22 Oct 96 - 11 Dec 96

Class 96B 7 Jan 97 - 26 Feb 97

Class 96C 27 Mar 97 - 14 May 97

Class96D 3 Jun 97 - 23 Jul 97

Class 96E 20 Aug 97 - 8 Oct 97

To be eligible to attend the SRNCOA, applicants must meet the following criteria:

- * Have at least one year retainability from graduation date.
- * Hold a secret or top secret security clearance.
- * Be within body fat limits outlined in AFI 40-502.
- * Be recommended by your immediate supervisor, and have concurrence of your commander.
- * Not be under investigation or charged with an offense punishable under the UCMJ.
- * Must have at least two years between completion of in-residence NCO Academy and the start of your SRNCOA class.
- * Have taken the Air Force Reading Achievement Test (a grade of 9.0 or higher is desirable).

All interested applicants should contact SMSgt Gates, Military Personnel Flight training officer, ext. 6590. Applications must be received by ANG/MPTEE no later than June 7, 1996.

CCAF credits transfer

That CCAF degree is worth more than you may realize, say base education & training

staff. In a survey of recent graduates, now attending a civilian college or university, CCAF found that only 3.4 % or 17 out of 202 people indicated that none of their credits transferred.



CCAF graduates reported that more than 71% of those attempting to transfer credit were successful in transferring more than a third of their CCAF credits to another school.

First for unit, Air Force

Recce pods pass Air Warrior test

The 192d FW broke new ground for the unit and the Air Force as it deployed to Nellis AFB; Nev., for two weeks in April to participate in Air Warrior.

The exercise was the unit's final equipment operations shakedown of a new reconnaissance pod the unit has been testing for the Air Force. The 192d became recce mission capable at the beginning of April and will deploy with the new, high tech equipment when the unit heads for Aviano AB, Italy, this summer.

The 58-member team deploying to Nellis in support of the 192d's recce training was a diverse group including pilots, security police, aircraft maintenance, communications, intelligence and administrative support people.

Col. Robert Seifert, operations group commander, was very pleased with the performance of the team and the equipment. "Earlier this year we had some problems with the pods, but everything has been going well here (at Nellis). We haven't missed any sorties, and have gotten pictures of all our assigned targets. Aircraft maintenance and avionics support has been great and equipment reliability has been very good. We shot high quality images of army tanks, trucks, helicopters, storage areas and landing strips," he said.

Air Warrior is an Air Combat Command exercise designed to provide air-land battle training for U.S. Army and Air Force combat air and theater air units. The on-going exercise provides training in a realistic close air support environment for many units. The 192d flew four recce missions each day, over the Ft. Irwin, Calif., training range. Air Force flying units from

Arizona and New Mexico also took part in Air Warrior 96-07.

LtCol Benjamin Petrone, 192d chief of intelligence, echoed Seifert's comments on the success of the exercise. "I was very impressed with the teamwork among our people," Petrone said. "Their combined efforts and talent made this project work well.

"We worked out of a ground station (mobile shelter), where we could quickly translate the pod's data and produce clear images. The new, computerized imaging equipment let us quickly analyze information and send valuable target or battle assessment information to units needing it. We sent imaging data long distances just as we might in a real combat situation."

The intel team also sent examples of pod imagery to Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Ronald Fogleman at the Pentagon. General Fogleman was a driving force behind the development of the F-16 recce pods, and has taken a keen interest in the program's progress.

Capt. Carl Bess, 192d maintenance officer said the maintenance troops, especially avionics, worked long hours during the exercise. He described the exercise as a great learning experience. Three civilian technical representatives worked with the maintenance troops to assist in analyzing and maintaining the recce pods.

The deployment contingent returned to the 192d on April 20.
