Seifert takes command of wing

Command of the 192d Fighter Wing changed hands Saturday, Dec. 7 as Col Robert O. Seifert became the new wing commander and Col William C. Jones moved to the Virginia ANG state headquarters.

Col Seifert moves into the wing commander's slot with 24 years of service to the 192d Fighter Wing and the Virginia ANG. The colonel served a tour with the active duty Air Force, as a fighter pilot, before joining the Guard. His first four years with the unit were as a traditional Guardsman; then in 1976 he joined the full-time staff. The new commander has served the wing as safety officer, operations scheduling officer, logistics group commander and most recently as its operations group commander.

The colonel cites growing up on a Wisconsin farm with giving him a strong work ethic, and he credits many of the wing's former leaders for being the role models he has strived to emulate over the years.

In addressing those present for the ceremony, Col Seifert talked about the qualities and traits of the dedicated airman. He discussed qualities such as character in integrity, leadership, patriotism, decisiveness, concern

for others, professionalism, love of flying, humility. And with each quality, Seifert named the leaders that most exemplified that quality for him. "This unit has had many great leaders. They've have set an example and a standard for us to follow. And as the best of leaders, they lead by example, not by intimidation.

CSAF launches new Joint Vision war game

A new series of annual war games brought warriors from all services together last month to look at how best to employ air and space power in crises and conflicts of the 21st Century.

Air Force Chief of Staff Gen. Ronald R. Fogleman and Secretary of the Air Force Dr. Sheila E. Widnall launched the inaugural Strategic Forces '96 war game at the Air Force Wargaming Institutes, Maxwell AFB, Ala.

There, under the close scrutiny of former theater commanders in chief, a joint force of warfighters and strategists recruited from serving CINC staffs worked with intelligence and foreign policy experts to tackle several crisis scenarios.

These scenarios were designed by internationally-recognized military strategists, long-range thinkers, the intelligence community, regional experts and industry. The scenarios required the war gamers to think critically about future military challenges.

Strategic Force '96 is an integral element of the Air Force long-range planning process. The exercise is being used as a template to test strategies and operational concepts derived from other long-range planning efforts. The war game showed how the Air Force of the future will support Joint Vision 2010—the Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff's vision for future joint warfighting concepts.

Joint Vision 2010 outlines future warfighting philosophy for military

The way the services prepare, fight and win on battlefield's of the 21st Century was set forth in Joint Vision 2010. The warfighting vision statement was formulated by Gen John M. Shalikashvili, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. The plan's main focus is Full Spectrum Dominance—achieving dominance across the range of military operations through the application of new operational concepts. Four operational concepts are involved in achieving that dominance. They are:

Dominant Maneuver: the multidimensional application of information, engagement and mobility capabilities to position and employ widely dispersed joint air, land, sea and space forces to accomplish operational tasks.

Precision Engagement: A network of systems that enables forces to locate the objective or target, provide responsive command and control, generate the desired effect, assess our level of success and retain the flexibility to re-engage with precision when required.

Full Dimensional Protection: The primary prerequisite for this will be control of the battlespace to ensure our forces can maintain freedom of action during deployment, maneuver and engagement, while providing multilayered defenses for our forces and facilities at all levels. This concept will enable the effective employment of forces while degrading opportunities for the enemy.

Focused Logistics: The fusion of information, logistics and transportation technologies to provide rapid crisis responses, to track and shift assets even while en route, and to deliver tailored logistics packages and sustainment directly at the strategic, operational and tactical level of operations. This will enable joint forces of the future to be more mobile, versatile and

projectable from anywhere in the world.

Together, these four concepts will enable forces to dominate the full range of military operations from humanitarian assistance, through peace operations up to and into the highest intensity conflict.

There will be three phases that will move on from the production of Shalikashvili's vision statement. The first phase—the conceptualization phase—is currently under way with the assessment and implementation phases to follow. Implementation of Joint Vision 2010 will involve commanders, the services and joint organizations. Each element will participate in developing and testing these new concepts and their overall integration. Modeling demonstrations, simulations, technology war games and joint exercise are being planned to help assess and validate these concepts, as well as assist in developing new operational procedures and organizations. F-16 sets flight hour record

The F-16 Flying Falcon soared into history Dec. 4 when the aircraft logged its five millionth hour of flying time.

The 388th Fighter Wing, Hill AFB, Utah, which was the first unit to get the F-16, flew an aerial performance to mark the historic event.

In an air combat role, the F-16's maneuverability and combat radius (distance it can fly to enter combat, fight and return) exceeds that of all potential-threat fighter aircraft. It can locate targets in all weather conditions and detect low-flying aircraft in radar ground clutter.

In an air-to-surface role, the F-16 can fly more than 500 miles to deliver weapons.

DNA specimens collected for ID purposes

Per Department of Defense requirements, National Guard units around the country have started collecting a small blood specimen from each of its members.

These blood specimens will be used to determine each Guard member's unique deoxyribonucleic acid (DNA) pattern. This pattern is more accurate than a fingerprint in identifying individuals. DNA tagging is being done throughout the military only for casualty identification purposes, according to a policy letter sent out by MGen Donald W. Shepperd, Air National Guard director.

New DoD policy requires DNA collection prior to an individual going on a deployment. Anyone in flying status needs to call the medical squadron immediately to schedule giving a blood specimen. All other Guard members must have the DNA identification process completed by Dec. 31, 1999. The 192d Medical Squadron is scheduling squadrons for blood specimen collections during the coming year.

Using government vehicles for personal reasons is a violation of public law.

"Do not use government vehicles for personal business, personal convenience or pleasure at any time," states SMSgt John Glenn, vehicle maintenance superintendent.

And during official business, Glenn reminds everyone, that regardless of position, they must not use government vehicles to conduct any type of personal business. Personal business includes, but is not limited to: trips to the post office, gym, golf course, bowling center, rod & gun club, ballfield, base exchange, commissary, Class Six store, laundry, bank or credit union.

Air Force vehicles are very visible to the public and their use is closely scrutinized, Glenn said. "The vehicle operator must make certain that Air Force owned, rented or leased motor vehicles are used only for official purposes."

Use your Va NG state tax deduction

All enlisted and officers (O-3 and below) in the Virginia National Guard are reminded of the Guard pay deduction you may take when filing your 1996 state income tax form.

The money you earn for your 12 drill weekends and 15 annual training days is deductible (up to \$3,000) on the deduction line of the Standard Deduction section of Form 760 Virginia Resident Individual Income Tax Return (long form).

The permitted deductions for all pay grades E-1 through O-3 are presented on the facing page.

If you wish to calculate your deduction, follow these steps:

- 1. Take your gross pay for a full Unit Training Assembly (UTA) (Be sure to use a 1996 pay stub or pay chart.);
- 2. Divide that number by 4 to get your daily rate:
- 3. Take your daily rate and multiply it by 48 to get your total earnings for drill days.
- 4. Multiply your daily rate by 15 to get your earnings for your 15 days of annual training.
- 5. Add together your earnings from line 3 and line 4.
- 6. If the total is less than \$3,000 you may take the entire sum as a deduction on your Virginia income tax form. If the total is more than \$3,000, you may take the maximum allowed deduction of \$3,000.

This deduction is only applicable to Virginia state income tax, and the deduction can only be made on the Virginia income tax long form. Also, when sending in your long form with the Virginia National Guard income tax deduction, you must

include a sheet of paper with the following statement written on it:

"I certify that I earned _____ for 39 days of active and inactive service with the Virginia Air National Guard for 1996."

(Member's rank & signature)

Also, if you have dependents and are claiming the Earned Income Tax Credit (on your federal income tax form), remember that all non-taxable income listed in block 13 on your W-2 form must be added to block 1 to determine your Adjusted Gross Income.

Finance plans base-wide BAQ recertification

"In our never-ending effort to provide you with the best customer service possible, Finance is planning a base-wide annual BAQ recertification for January, February and March," reports Sgt Paulette Burrell, Finance Office.

All Guard members are asked to stop by Club 149 anytime between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. on drill-weekend Saturdays or between 8 and 11 a.m. on drill Sundays, during January, February or March. Failure to recertify for your Basic Allowance for Quarters during these months will result in your BAQ being discontinued, according to Burrelll. After being discontinued, you will have to bring in the required documentation to have the benefit reinstated.
