Handle frustration, don't let it handle you

If, in the course of your human events, (and you're a average person) you have to deal with bad news, no matter what kind: a difficult person, a major disappointment of some type, or heaven forbid, an ORE/ORI; more than likely you'll develop certain habits, ways of reacting to these adversities.

Unfortunately, these habits, often bad ones, inevitably serve us ill. We overreact, blow things out of proportion, hold on tightly, and focus on the negative aspects of life. When we are immobilized by little things-when we are irritated, annoyed (everything can be annoying when you're in chemical gear), and easily bothered our (over) reactions not only make us frustrated, but actually get in the way of achieving goals.

We lose sight of the bigger picture, focus on the negative, and annoy other people who might otherwise help us. In short, we focus on that one problem as if it were one great big emergency! Often, we rush around looking busy, trying to solve problems, but in reality, the snowball effect is given new life, and the forward motion is almost impossible to stop (a flurry of activity but no real productivity). Because everything seems like such a big deal, we end up spending our lives dealing with one snowball after another.

After a while, we begin to believe everything really is a big deal. We fail to recognize that the way we react to our problems has a lot to do with

Make sure BDUs are updated

The deadline has passed for updating the Battle Dress Uniform (BDUs). Oct. 1 was the cutoff date for removing the aircrew style name tags on the BDUs. Now the green name tape and green U.S. Air Force tape should be in place over the top of the BDU blouse pockets. The Air Force tape goes over the left pocket (over your heart) and your name tape goes over the right pocket. Subdued stripes should be sewn on the sleeves of the BDU blouse and subdued (metal or cloth) officer rank may be sewn or clipped

onto the collar, as appropriate.

Also, the Air Combat Command (ACC) and unit patches must now be worn on the BDU pockets. The unit patch is centered on the left pocket (below the Air Force tape). The ACC patch is centered on the right pocket (below your name tape).

If you have any questions, please consult AFI 36-2903 and the ACC Supplement to 36-2903. Uniforms should be updated prior to the January deployment.

how quickly and efficiently we solve them. Some of the problems each us will face during the ORE/ORI will seem "insurmountable." Before the ORE/ORI, practice reacting to those "insurmountable" problems, not only as an individual but as a team. It is very important for everyone on the team to know how to react to the challenges the IG Team will present. Not only is it important that the team reacts correctly, it is even more important that the team leaders react correctly.

One of my favorite posters says, "Life is a test. It is only a test. Had this been a real life you would have been instructed where to go and what to do." Whenever I think of this humorous bit of wisdom, it reminds me not to take life so seriously. When you look at life and its many challenges as a test, or series of tests, you begin to see each issue you face as an opportunity to grow and learn, a chance to roll with the punches. Whether you're being bombarded with problems, responsibilities, even "insurmountable" hurdles when looked at as a test, you always have the opportunity to succeed, in the sense of rising above that which is challenging you.

My point is this: Project officers are going to try to present the most difficult situations possible, and will evaluate us on how we tackle these situations. We can all see what's coming, but we need to develop a plan, the leaders need to develop a plan, and then we need to follow those plans. Don't overreact, get and stay focused on safety, and get the job done with the least amount of pain possible.

A great number of reliable, well-trained people are working together to make this exercise go as it should, and without doubt, if each team leader and team member keeps it all in one sock, it will. Team leaders and team members must develop a plan and carry it through. Merely putting bombs on target in the time allotted is not enough; the bigger plan must also be shown to work—getting deployed and back with personnel and equipment, properly wearing the chemical warefare gear and providing for human needs.

And, another thing: some "insurmountable" problems are just that; INSURMOUNTABLE! My insurmountable thing is: WHICH BUS DO I RIDE, AND WHAT DO I DO IF I SEE A UXO?

Know what needs packing

Prepare now, be ready for ORE

The Wing is preparing for the Operational Readiness Exercise set for early January. Now is the time to check your gear to make sure you have everything you need. Evaluators and inspectors will be randomly checking both chemical warfare gear bags and personal bags to make sure unit members are packing at least the minimum deployment gear during the ORE and the Operational Readiness Inspection.

Each person should have a bag or knapsack for their chemical warfare gear, which includes: a chemical warfare suit (pants and jacket), a pair of protective boots, a pair of gloves and glove liners, gas mask with hood, web belt with chemical kit and canteen, and a helmet. Check your gear before or during the December drill. Any unserviceable equipment should be repaired or replaced before January's deployment. Also, make sure your rank, last name and Air Force Specialty Code is printed (on tape) affixed to the front and back of your helmet. Be sure to bring the ziplock bag containing your safety booklet and the blue ATSO booklet (ability to survive and operate).

In addition to chem gear, each person deploying to Savannah must pack uniforms and personal hygiene gear. Be sure to pack enough clothing, uniform items and personal hygiene gear to last a full week. Air Force Instruction 10-403 states that individuals are recommended to pack the following items:

Non-Aircrew Members

- 1 duffel bag or soft luggage
- 4 sets of battle dress uniforms
- 1 pair of combat boots
- 1 BDU cap
- 1 web belt

Socks, t-shirts, undergarments as required

1 field jacket w/liner 1 set rain gear/poncho cold weather gear as required

Aircrew Members

- 1 duffel bag or soft luggage
- 4 flight suits
- 1 pair flight boots
- 1 flight cap
- 4 pair flight gloves

Socks, t-shirts, undergarments as required

1 flight jacket

shower clogs

Recommended Personal Hygiene Kit

(For the ORE & ORI, pack a 7 day supply.)

portable toiletry bag soap shampoo nail clippers toothpaste toothbrush deodorant comb/brush

razor(s) shaving cream towel(s) wash cloth(s)

sanitary napkins/tampons

For more information on mandatory and recommended packing items, check the Personal Clothing Items Briefing paper that should be in your mobility folder. Civilian clothes may include long pants, warm shirts and a jacket for the January deployment and warmer-weather clothing for the April deployment.

And just a reminder...

Everyone is reminded to carry a copy of their orders and their military I.D. card with them at all times during the ORE/ORI or any type of deployment. If you have a military driver's license or a restricted area badge and badge holder, bring those also.

Phone system provides access to pay info

The Defense Finance and Accounting service has created an automated phone system which provides quick access to pay and leave information for military people, their family members and retirees.

The active duty Air Force number is 1-800-755-7413, and the number for retirees is 1-800-321-1080.

People must have their most recent leave and earnings statement available during their first call in order to verify account information and set up a personal identification number (PIN) for future access. People must also give their home zip code, tax exemptions and marital status for tax purposes during their first call.

Military family members use their spouse's PIN.

Use caution with AMEX card in Savannah


Don't use it for gifts, holiday cash

Finance officials with the 192d Fighter Wing remind VaANG members not to use their American Express government travel card for personal cash or to buy gifts over the holidays. Also, they remind unit members that the AMEX card cannot be used during annual field training in Savannah, Ga., unless the purchase is something you will be reimbursed for on a travel voucher.

As the holiday season approaches, government travel card officials remind users that American Express automated teller machine cash is for officials use only. Card officials look anxiously toward the holidays, a time traditionally punctuated by increases in charges, not all of them for official business.

"I am certain that few Air Force travelers are on temporary duty Dec. 20-25 when we see extra high cash use," said Michael Weber from the Office of the Air Force Director of Accounting and Banking. "The card should only be used for official business. Cardholders should remember that the use of that extra cash from the government American Express card is not worth the problems it could cause when they have to explain to their commander why they used the card inappropriately."

John Stull, director of account development for American Express Government Services, agreed, noting the link between card abuse and financial mismanagment. "We consistently see a correlation between inappropriate use of cash and cardholder delinquencies," he said. "This is especially true during the holiday season. In 1995 and 1996, the percentage of cash withdrawn over the December holidays by Air Force cardholders increased more than 10 percent, leading to a spike in delinquencies."

We stood and we promised to think safety and refrain from play, and the colonel said, "You'll fix it, read the reg and give a brief at the next training day!"

In the words of this poem the meaning is clear, you can't be complacent just because the holidays are here.

Wing, Support Gp announce 1stSgt slots

The 192d Fighter Wing and 192d Support Group are accepting applications for the positions of First Sergeant.

As a vital link between the commander, base agencies and the enlisted personnel of the unit, first sergeants must be creditable, perceptive and epitomize the core values of the Air Force and Air National Guard. They must have a high level of competency, energy and motivation, and be able to communicate effectively. A first sergeant promotes enlisted welfare, morale and health issues and assists the commander in maintaining discipline and standards of conduct, and provides guidance on matters of leadership, military justice and customs and courtesies. A first sergeant must be exemplary in professional conduct and appearance. Strong leadership traits, professional maturity and command support are a must.

Minimum qualifications include:

—completion of high school or general education development equivalency and meet all requirements listed in AFM 36-2108. Aptitude scores must be at least 45 in administrative or 58 in general.

-Must be a master sergeant or promotable

to MSgt/E-7 (Reference ANGI 36-2102, para 1.2).

—Prior qualification at the 7 or 9 skill level in any Air Force Specialty Code.

—Within 12 months of selection, MUST complete the First Sergeant's Academy in residence.

—Have exceptional leadership and managerial skills.

—Must meet weight and body fat standard, and overall image should exceed minimum standards.

—Applicants must have completed PME Course 6 in residence or correspondence prior to application (Reference ANGI 36-2102, para 1.3).

—Upon promotion to master sergeant, completion of PME Course 8 is mandatory.

Members wishing to apply for either of these positions must submit a cover letter and resume to LtCol Ralph Barker, Col William Schwartz or LtCol Robert Pemberton by 4 p.m., Jan. 25, 1998 (drill weekend). 

Guard members may now join dental program

Humana Military Healthcare Service (HMHS) has been selected to run the new TriCare Selected Reserve Dental Program. All traditional Guard members and technicians (code 1 & 2) are eligible to join this dental program. Family members aren't eligible for this program.

HMHS is mailing a dental program application to all eligible Guardmembers—using each person's DEERS home address. If a Guard member's home address is incorrect, they won't receive an application. (Address listings are updated at the customer service counter in the Military Personnel Flight.)

The MPF has no responsibility for the dental program. Guard members who wish to enroll must complete the application and pay \$17.44 in advance for the first 4 months of coverage. Be sure to send the money and completed application back to HMHS.

Retirees now eligible for dental program

Delta Dental Plan of California has been awarded the contract to administer the Defense Department's new dental plan for military retirees (including the Coast Guard), their eligible family members and unremarried surviving spouses of deceased military retirees.

Benefits for eligible persons who choose to enroll begin Feb. 1, 1998. Under the contract, enrollees pay the full premium for coverage.

Initial enrollment in the program is for at least 24 months. Enrollees must submit a payment equal to four months' worth of premiums with their initial enrollment application. After the first 24-month period, enrollees may choose to stay enrolled on a month-to-month basis.

The contractor divided the country into five

regions and premiums vary according to location. Average monthly premiums in the first year of the contract range from \$12.26 for one person, to \$23.80 for two persons, to \$39.31 for a family.

The plan features a variety of diagnostic, preventive, restorative, endodontic, periodontic and oral surgery services, at specified levels of cost-sharing. Some services (mostly diagnostic and preventive services) do not require a payment by enrollees. There is a \$50 annual deductible before cost-sharing begins. Not counting diagnostic and preventive services, enrollees have a benefit worth up to \$1,000 per enrollment year. More information will be mailed to eligible persons by Delta as the program start date approaches.

2.8% pay raise kicks in Jan. 1, 1998

President Clinton signed the Fiscal Year '98 Defense Authorization Act into law Nov. 18, paving the way for a 2.8 percent basic pay raise and boost in other allowances.

Congressional conferees also supported the president's original requests for funding the F-22 Raptor and the Air Force development of the Joint Strike Fighter. More money is also authorized to either buy more B-2 bombers or to modify and repair the existing fleet.

Besides the 2.8 percent pay raise that takes effect Jan. 1, the act mandates that military compensation not be reduced for personnel assigned to duty away from permanent duty station or wile assigned to duty under field conditions at home station.

Pay charts reflecting the raise will be printed in the Vanguard as soon as they are available.

What do I do this weekend?

Manpower pool, skeleton shifts for UTA

Everyone is asked to report to their duty section at 8 a.m. Saturday morning (Oct. 11). Section Supervisors will take roll as usual on a drill morning, then they will let their troops know if their shop, office or work section will maintain a skeleton staff or close down during the air show (Oct. 11&12). The Section Supervisor will assign skeleton staff to staggered/rotating shifts (preferably no more than 4 hours work each day for skeleton staff). Supervisors will inform skeleton staff of their work shifts.

The names of staff who won't be required to work in their assigned section will be taken down by the supervisor, and each person will be assigned to a 4-hour Manpower Pool shift on Saturday and on Sunday. Shifts will run from 8:30 a.m.-12:30 p.m. and 12:30 p.m.-until on Saturday and from 7 a.m.-12:30 p.m. and 12:30 p.m.-until on Sunday. Anyone willing to help with Air Show tear down beginning around 5 p.m. Sunday should give their name to their supervisor. The supervisor will turn your name in to the Manpower Pool Supervisor.

The supervisor will call the MOC and let them know how many troops will be available from that section during each shift. All manpower personnel will report to the Manpower Pool location at the double-wide trailer sitting near the southwest corner of the Maintenance Hangar. Report to the Manpower Pool supervisor and hang loose and wait for Manpower Pool work requests to come in. Duties could range from emptying trash barrels; carrying bags of ice, tables or chairs to various locations, selling souvenir programs, etc.

When someone needs help from the manpower pool, they will radio the MOC or call ext. 6338 or 6339. Tell the MOC what type of task you need completed; when, where, how many people you need for the job; approximate time needed to do job; if workers walk to location, ride shuttle bus, or will GOV transportation be provided; and the name of person to contact at job site.

The MOC notifies the Manpower Pool Supervisor of all job requirements and the supervisor assigns Manpower Pool members to the job. Manpower Pool workers should take the MOC phone number with them to a job site; if there are any problems when they get out to the job site, they can call back to the MOC to get more help or duty clarification. Manpower Pool workers are expected to finish their task unless it is an ongoing task or if finishing it is going to take them more than 45 minutes after their end-of-shift time. (In these cases, call the MOC and have replacements sent. Don't leave task until

The ceremony dedicating the newly-constructed Virginia Air National Guard Memorial begins at 10:30 this morning (Sat., Oct. 11)



If you have any routine questions or Air Show issues that crop up during the weekend, pick up a base phone and call the Event Operations Center at ext. 6427 or dial 236-6427 from a cellular phone. If you notice any suspicious activity on base during the Air Show, call the EOC. It that line is busy, call Central Security Control at ext 6360.

If you don't have access to a telephone use a radio to call your workcenter with any problems or concerns. The workcenter will forward your message to the EOC.
