Col Seifert announces staff moves

Hicks takes on 50th full time

The Virginia Air National Guard's 50th anniversary celebration is a little more than four months away.

Overseeing the range of events planned to commemorate the 50th anniversary has become more than a full-time job for LtCol Steve Hicks. As 50th anniversary project officer, Hicks has been working with an ever-growing team of retirees, civilians and many other Guard members to plan and fine tune the events set for Oct. 10, 11 and 12—a two-day air show, a formal dinner, a hangar dance, and the building and dedication of the VaANG memorial.

With Hicks working on the 50th Anniversary full-time, Col Robert Seifert, 192d Fighter Wing commander, has tasked LtCol Johnny O. Haikey, 149th Fighter Sq, to temporarily take over Hicks regular full-time job.

As of May 1, Haikey was named Acting Logistics Group Commander. He will hold the position until the 50th Anniversary Celebration is over. Haikey is now located in the Logistics Group commander's office.

The pace of planning and preparing for the 50th anniversary is increasing every day, Hicks said. "We've had a lot of good support, but we need more. The success of this event will be determined by us and the amount of effort and support we give to it."

Anyone interested in helping out with any event or activity should contact Hicks. For the next five months the colonel will be using office 8B in the Support Group (Mission Support) Orderly Room, rm 8, in the Wing Headquarters building.

At the same time, Colonel Seifert announced that Maj Bobby Sandford, 149th FS, is the project officer for the Operational Readiness Exercise in September and the Operational Readiness Inspection scheduled for April 1998.

Also last month, Colonel Seifert rotated the assignments of three full-time officers as a career broadening experience. Maj L.J. Cerritelli has become the new 192d Security Police Sq commander, Capt James O. Parker has moved into Cerritelli's position as chief of Wing Plans, and Capt Eliot G. Evans has become the wing's new training and executive support officer.

Commander's Call

Education vital to our success

In America we recognize the importance of education. Education is credited with being the engine that has driven our progress. We spend a great deal of time and money trying to attain the best education we can, and rightfully so. Education is the key to achievement.

The Air Force recognizes this and spends large sums of money to educate and train its airmen. Much of this education is job related. I am speaking of technical training schools and career development courses (CDCs) designed to teach you how to do your job. These forms of instruction are very important.

The Air Force also has as a branch of education called professional military education (PME). PME includes Noncommissioned Officer (NCO) Leadership School, NCO Academy, Senior NCO Academy and professional officer courses. For many the mention of PME does not bring feelings of joy. Professional military education is often tied to career progression and promotion. Because it is difficult, and time is not always available, many feel it is not fair to link it to advancement.

Major General Don Shepperd, director of the Air National Guard, has placed great emphasis on PME for the Air Guard. He has placed particular emphasis on PME taken in residence. General Shepperd is right. PME and PME in residence is an important part of career development. It should be part of your career development. I have struggled with the suggestion that in residence PME should be a requirement (I can assure you it is already a consideration) for certain jobs or grades. It is probably to early to make it a requirement. But that will happen, and I want you to be prepared.

We recently had three individuals graduate from the NCO Academy in residence. They are MSgt Sherry Hankins, SSgt Jonathan Cooper and SSgt Anslem Hyndman. I want to congratulate them and also encourage them to join our NCO Academy graduate association and encourage other VaANG NCOs to attend the program in residence. It is important for the future of us all. Well trained leadership is critical to success.

New fuel farm nears completion

After nearly five months of delays due to bad weather and poor site conditions, the new Fuels (POL) Complex is nearing completion. Once completed, fuel delivery capabilities and aircraft refueling will be greatly enhanced. The new facility is state of the art; it is designed improve 192nd flying operations and increase environmental safety.

The new facility, located on Thunder Chief Rd., has two above ground tanks, a lab permitting the analysis of jet fuel on site, and several other amenities that will enable SMSgt Eddie Harris, POL superintendent, and his staff to work more efficiently and cost effectively.

The F-16 Falcon normally requires 1,800-1,900 gallons of fuel at take off and a typical fuel truck can hold 6,000 gallons of fuel. Considering these capacities, using one truck to refuel approximately three aircraft may seem like an

easy task. However, this task intensifies when the drill weekend flying schedule demands 20 sorties a day. This task will become much more manageable with the new facility; the increased fuel storage capacity and fuel pumping capabilities of the new POL complex, will make aircraft refueling a quicker more efficient process.

The two new above ground storage tanks will each hold 105,000 gallons of JP-8 jet fuel. The tanks have been put through pumping, storage and filtration tests during the last month. The completion date for the new POL Complex will be announced in the near future, and a grand opening ribbon cutting ceremony is being planned. The existing tanks, installed (below ground) in 1943, will be removed upon completion of the new facility.

Wing seeks applications for NCO position

The 192d Fighter Wing has a new vacancy for a senior enlisted, traditional Guard member. The wing is currently accepting applications from interested individuals for the new Human Resource Force Management Noncommissioned Officer (NCO) E-8 slot.

The Human Resource Force Management NCO will work at the wing level, on behalf of the Adjutant General. The HRFM NCO will work with all wing/unit functional managers by assisting with the coordination, development, implementation and measurement of programs that ensure the unit is meeting all ANG human resource management short-term and long-term goals. Minimum mandatory eligibility requirements are:

- 1. Must be a traditional Guard member.
- Must be able to attend a two-week HRFM NCO course within six months of selection.
 - 3. Must be a promotable master sergeant

(E-7) with at least a 7-skill level, 13 years time in service, 24 months time in grade and in-residence attendance at SrNCO Academy or completion of Extension Course Institute (ECI) Course 8, or be an existing senior master sergeant (E-8).

- Must have at least 24 months retainability on current enlistment contract.
- 5. Must have strong writing and verbal communication skills.

The HRFM NCO position is a three-year appointment with an option for a three-year extension, based on approval by the wing commander. A resume and cover letter must be submitted by anyone applying for the job. The resumes must be dropped off at LtCol Ralph Barker's office by close of business Sunday, June 8. To help candidates prepare their resume, a position description may be previewed in Barker's office, Wing Headquarters Bldg, room 8A.

101 Critical Days have begun

Memorial Day is the day we remember the men and women who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country. It is also the weekend that starts the Air Force safety awareness period known as the 101 Critical Days of summer (running from Memorial Day weekend through Labor Day weekend). It is a time when our people are exposed to increased risks of injury or death from accidents, according to SMSgt Wayne Keene, wing safety technician.

Summer is the time of year when activities and events promote a relaxed atmosphere, which can lead to accidents, warn wing safety staff. Both young people and more experienced people need to take a moment out every once in a while to think about the dangers and consequences they face if they don't abide by accepted safety practices. The leading cause of death is private vehicle accidents involving drinking and driving. Designated Drivers are a must anytime people are drinking alcohol. Everyone must remember to use their seat belts when driving or riding in motor vehicles. They also remind people to wear helmets and other appropriate personal protective equipment when riding bikes and motorcycles. They also urge anyone spending time around boats to learn proper boating safety before powering up the motor or climbing on a jet ski. Anyone going hiking or backpacking is encouraged to go in a group or at least with a buddy.

And day dream about those fun summer activities when you are on breaks or off duty, not while you are in the middle of an important task. "The dividends of an accident free summer are endless," Keene points out. "Make the summer of '97 a safe and happy time. Safety is up to each an every one of us."

Civil Engineers tackle humanitarian assistance project in Ecuador

The 192d Civil Engineer Squadron returned from Ecuador in early March from a mission that allowed them to do more than build structures.

The 38 Guard members came home with memories of how they built some very special friendships—helping the men, women and children of two small, remote Ecuadorian village called Latacunga and Pujili. During their annual field training deployment, the civil engineers, including specialists in each area of building construction, built a medical facility badly needed by the community.

Although the laborwas intense, the schedule was tight, and the means of construction were antiquated, the 192d CE airmen accomplished their task. During this humanitarian mission, the civil engineers had several other hurdles to overcome in order to successfully complete their mission. Prior to and during their deployment, the Educadorian government was in the process of crumbling. The Ecuadorian Congress had lost faith in the country's president; and the president and two other political leaders were haggling over who was running the country. Also, the Latacunga villagers only spoke Spanish; Airman Abigail Gonzalez, Communications Sq information management specialist, volunteered to accompany the civil engineers and act as their interpreter. Because of the many health problems associated with parts of South America, CMSgt Larry Byers, 192d Medical Sq, accompanied the troops as team medic. Nearly half of the people on the deployment were overcome by stomach viruses during the two-week stint.

The only transportation to and from the site each day was a 90-minute (each way), grueling truck ride along unpaved dusty and bumpy passages. (It was hard to even consider calling them roads.)

By the end of the stay, the townspeople had bonded with the CE team, and the CE personnel had developed a strong attachment to the townspeople. They realized they had made a significant contribution to this small community and it made them feel close to the town and its people. Electrician MSgt Chris Hodge commented, "I have developed a new spiritual awareness by going on this trip." Plumber SSgt Galen Harris said, "I speak little Spanish, but we all understood the basics of the international language called love or human compassion." Capt Keith Watson, deployment commander, said, "In my 14 years with the reserves, this was my most rewarding deployment."

CMSgt Ed Brown wrote a farewell speech and while delivering it through Gonzalez, many of the townspeople wept. The villages are located about 60 miles south of the equator at 10,000-11,000 feet altitude in central Ecuador. The area is rimmed with live volcanoes. However, CE members had little time off to enjoy the natural spectacles.

Museum features WWII Tuskegee Airmen exhibit

The museum of aviation at Robins AFB, Ga., has opened a new exhibit to recognize the Tuskegee Airmen of World War II and the achievements of black Americans in aviation. The 5,000 square foot exhibit is called "America's Black Eagles--The Tuskegee Pioneers...and beyond."

"This is a major exhibit, inique in Georgia, and to our knowledge the largest in the country," said Peggy Young, museum director. "The Tuskegee Airmen of World War II played a key role in the integration of the Armed Forces and their record in combat is unequaled. It is our intention to highlight the sacrifices and significan contributions they and other black Americans made to the U.S. Air Force and our nation.

The exhibit uses as its centerpiece a recreation of the Tuskegee Airmen experience at Tuskegee Army Air Field near Tuskegee Institute,


Ala.--site of segregated military aviation training for blacks in WWII.



- 2. AM assemblies will be 0800-1200 (Sat) 0700-1100 (Sun) and PM assemblies will be 1300-1700 (Sat) 1200-1600 (Sun), with the following exceptions: Assembly for one flight of Food Services Personnel: AM 0630-1030 (Sat) 0530-0930 (Sun), PM 1100-1530 (Sat) 1000-1430 (Sun). Additional duty hours to cover special work requirements such as pre-flight, post-flight, etc. will be scheduled by each unit as required. Each UTA will be no less than four hours duration excluding lunch periods.
- 3. Excused absences from UTAs must be for a reasonable cause and must be arranged in advance by the individual and his/her supervisor. To be excused, an absence must be made up through equivalent training (EQT). EQTs with pay must be performed within 30 days of the missed UTA and within the same fiscal year. EQTs without pay (retirement points only) can be performed any time during the member's anniversary year. Only four (4) EQTs with pay are permitted each fiscal year.
- 4. Commanders may utilize Rescheduled Unit Training Assemblies (RUTAs) to achieve training objectives using maximum availability of equipment and full-time personnel resources that cannot be achieved during UTAs and SUTAs. A RUTA must be requested, approved and documented in advance of the missed UTA.


