

Well-rehearsed Guard members – Capts. Kathy Kahlson and Tony Schlagel, MSgt. Rick Anderson, TSgt. Len Carter and SSgt. Lori Wall – were ready with the answers: Get a good sleep the night before, eat a good breakfast and don't worry about the tests. You've studied the material, so you're in good shape.

Vanna's hand-lettered signs were crowd favorites: "How do you spell S.O.L.?" one sign read. He got an ear-splitting answer.

Kahlson and Carter interjected their own cornball humor.

"Knock-knock," Kahlson said.

"Who's there?" the kids responded.

"Butternut stay up too late the night before the tests."

Laughs. Smiles. Groans.

The rally was replete with a row of pompom-equipped cheerleaders (teachers) and Uncle Sam (Principal June Murphy).



The New GI Mailfrom afcrossroads.com

Keeping in touch is one of the most important events a service member and his/her family wants to maintain when a separation occurs due to deployment.

Currently, many are relying on their own service providers and personal commercial e-mail such as yahoo.com.

While this is immediately more convenient, it can be slower in getting through. It also runs the risk of being shut down without notice due to security precaution.

The Global Internet Mail, or GI Mail, provides a secure method through afcrossroads.com to allow Service members and their families to communicate with each other through e-mail. The service is avail-

able at https://www.gimail.af.mil. It functions in every theater of operations because it is on a military server with no advertising.

GI Mail will be allowed through when other services are down or impaired because of hacker or virus threats.

GI Mail is available to Air Guard members, their families and all Department of Defense members worldwide. Eligibility to use the system is determined by the Air Force Crossroads interface with the Defense Eligibility Enrollment Reporting System. Once validated as a GI Mail member, the account's user-ID and password can be used to access the system from anywhere in the world.



Both spouses need to establish their own accounts in order to be able to email to each other at any time.

The new GI Mail will offer many improvements, including an enhanced, easier-to-use interface. It will allow automatic forwarding of your mail, even to multiple accounts if you wish. You will be able to set up an automatic answering message for times when you will not be able to answer your mail immediately. We believe you will like the new GI Mail.

Finance 201- Understanding Your Credit Report

This months financial feature is taken from Credit Talk, a great website found at www.credittalk.com. It is good, easy to understand information about how to handle your personal financial snapshot.

"Many people don't understand credit reports, why they're important and what's in them.

Think of a credit report as a resume of how well you have paid your bills and used financial tools such as credit cards and checks.

Just like a report card or a resume, a credit report is used to document your performance, in this case, your financial

performance.

The report details how well you pay your bills, bank loans and credit card purchases. It also can indicate if you have abused financial tools such as checking accounts and debit cards. Even debts of small amounts, if not paid on time, can hurt your credit standing.

Information on a credit report can remain for many years. (This is often referred to as your "credit history.") Since this report is used by others to make important decisions affecting you, it is important to review your credit report for accuracy once a year."

Below is a list of information that can appear on a credit report:

- Your name, Social Security number, birth date and current and previous addresses.
- Information about your employers, both current and previous.
- Your payment history with major credit cards, department store charge accounts and loan payments.
- Your payment history with utility and telephone services.
- A list of your accounts (if any) that have been referred to a collection agency.
- Inquiries made about your credit history that have been made over the past several years, and whether or not you were granted credit.
- Public record information: such as bankruptcies, foreclosures, and tax problems.





Mr. Lewis Heath, a firefighter with the 192nd CES/CEF, Virginia Air National Guard Fire and Rescue Department, was recently selected to receive the Governors Award for Outstanding Achievement. Only seven employees throughout the State of Virginia were chosen for this prestigious recognition.

During his 10 years with the Virginia Air National Guard, Lewis Heath has constantly strived to increase workplace safety through innovative and practical solutions. He has been an active member of the Department's Occupational Safety and Health Committee since its inception, providing valuable advice on projects to achieve a greater level of safety.

One recent example provides insight into Lewis' concern for safety:

Lewis noticed a severe hazard existed with emergency vehicles because of inadequate emergency lighting on each vehicle. He researched the applicable regulations and standards, gained appropriate approval from necessary base agencies, procured alternate funding to save precious fire department resources and completed the installation of the entire fleet. The result is more visible pieces of equipment readily identifiable to motorists when responding to an emergency, creating a safer work environment for employees and ultimately a
