
Christians could draw a picture of

Air Force Uniform Board Releases Results

Air Force officials recently released the results of the 96th Air Force Uniform Board held June 18 and 19. The chief of staff approved a number of changes, affecting everything from cell phones to scarves. Among the changes are:

- Establish a standardized Air Force physical training uniform.
- Redesign the female lightweight blue jacket.
- Authorize the lightweight blue jacket to be worn indoors.
- Authorize, as an option, to have the Air Force symbol embroidered on the lightweight blue jacket.
- Offer the A-line skirt as an optional item.
- Redesign and revise maternity uniforms.
- Authorize wear of the black scarf only with all Air Force uniforms, eliminating white, gray and olive drab options.
- Authorize conservative ornamentation on nonprescription sunglasses and eyeglasses.
- Authorize one small, black, nondescript personal digital assistant, pager or cellular phone at a time to be worn on the uniform belt.

- Allow females to wear small, black spherical earrings when in uniform.
- Allow black web belts or black riggers belts with nondescript buckles as an optional item with the battle dress uniform.
- Remove the requirement to wear a tie or tab with shortsleeved shirt or blouse while traveling on a commercial airline.
- Authorize wear of a backpack over both shoulders.
- Authorize only a solid-color black backpack with blue uniform combinations and solid black, olive drab or woodland camouflage backpack with battle dress uniforms.
- Redesign the security forces beret.
- Allow the wear of plain black conservative hairpins, combs, headbands, elastic bands and barrettes with all female hair colors.
- Allow males to cleanly shave their heads or have military high-and-tight haircuts; females are not authorized to shave their heads or wear high-and-tight haircuts.

More information about these and other uniform board decisions will be included in the next update of Air Force Instruction 36-2903, being released this summer. Questions should be addressed to the 192d FW Military Personnel Flight.

The 200th Weather Flight...

The 200th Weather Flight is the smallest of the four separate units making up the Virginia Air National Guard. With only 23 people, they account for a mere 1.85 percent of the 1,239-strong VaANG. However, since Sept. 11, 2001, 16 of its 18 qualified members have performed mission-essential duties in support of critical U.S. military

contingencies. Since then, these individuals have logged an incredible 4,092 days of active duty – that averages out to 227days/per qualified individual – not counting drill periods and annual training days. They did everything from supporting U.S. ground troops in Iraq to providing management and leadership training for ANG weather personnel nationwide.

Within hours of the Sept. 11, 2001, terrorist attack on the nation, the Weather Flight had equipment and personnel ready to support military activities anywhere in the state. Two members of the unit

were mobilized to support Operation Noble Eagle activities, then involuntarily extended for two years in support of Operation Enduring Freedom. The Weather Flight provided round-the-clock weather forecasting services and pilot and staff weather briefings for the 192d Fighter Wing's homeland defense missions for several weeks after Sept. 11, supporting the Wing's ongoing combat air patrol missions. In addition, the unit provided augmentees for duty in the 192d's Survival Recovery Center.

In the midst of this the Weather Flight commander became the first Air Guard weather officer to serve as the meteorological task force officer in support of ongoing peacekeeping efforts in Bosnia-Herzegovina. Lt.Col. Robert E. Wallace was the ranking weather officer in country, providing weather support and leadership for the U.S. Army's 29th Infantry Division and all joint task force units in country from November 2001 through February 2002. In addition, three unit members deployed as part of an Air Force Aerospace Expeditionary Force deployment to Prince Sultan Air Base, Saudi Arabia, to support Operation Southern Watch.

Also in this time frame, another Weather Flight member provided weather observation and forecasting services for the Joint Task Force Olympics, in support of the 2002 Winter Olympics held in Salt Lake City, Utah. The weather support team worked out of Hill Air Force Base, near Ogden, Utah. And a small contingent of Weather Flight personnel deployed to Nellis AFB, Nevada, to provide pilot and staff weather briefings for Iowa, South

Dakota and Mississippi Air Guard units participating in an Air Warrior training exercise.

Unit personnel were also called on to teach two sessions of the Air National Guard Weather Flight Management Seminar – a two-week course designed to prepare weather flight commanders for unit leadership. The 200th WF commander and weather operations chief also assisted the ANG with the weather career field summit and strategic planning meeting at Andrews AFB, Maryland.

Activity (quite literally) heated up even more in 2003 as five WF

members deployed with U.S. ground troops for the invasion of Iraq. The forecasters deployed with the 19th Air Support Operations Squadron, which supports the Army's 101st Airborne (Air Assault) Division, and served with the 101st in Baghdad. They served in the sands of northern Kuwait, and from Baghdad to Mosul. Sandstorms were so intense at times that personnel movement was restricted and daytime tasks as simple as visiting the latrine required a compass to ensure safe return to workcenters because of extremely limited visibility. The forecasters had to work with their equipment sheathed in plastic to keep the corrosive sand from ruining their electronics.

Two unit members performed as crisis action team controllers at Andrews Air Force Base, Maryland, for an extended period. They handled the mobilization, redeployment and demobilization of all Air National Guard weather assets deployed around the world. Meanwhile two other 200th WF members deployed to support the 28th Operations Weather Squadron at Shaw AFB, South Carolina. While there, they provided weather and ground conditions forecasting support for ongoing Operation

On November 2, 2004, we will be electing a President and Vice President, 34 U.S. Senators, the entire House of Representatives and thirteen state Governors. There will also be thousands of other state and local office elections. Election laws differ from state to state, but most state election laws require the absentee ballot requests to be received at least 30 days before the general election. With Election Day so close there is not much time left. So be sure to register to vote and apply for your absentee ballot as soon as you are able.

Our men and women are fighting and dying to secure freedom and democracy for citizens around the world. Make sure you obtain your absentee ballot and exercise your right to vote! Find a Ballot Buddy- where you and a friend commit to getting your absentee ballots and voting.

VETERANS DON'T NEED CASH TO BUY A HOME



Normally, Guardsmen and reservists have to serve six years before becoming eligible for a VA home loan. But that requirement changes dramatically when Air National Guardsmen are called to active duty during wartime.

Keith Pedigo, director of the VA Loan Guaranty Service, wants to get the word out that the number of loans would increase even more if all Guardsmen and reservists knew that being on active duty dramatically reduces the time it takes for them to become eligible for the loans. During wartime, the requirement in active service is reduced to 90 days for an traditional guardsman to become eligible for a VA home loan.

Guardsmen and reservists can find out if they qualify for a home loan by submitting an application for a certificate of eligibility along with a copy of their service record to one of the two VA Eligibility Centers.

Those centers are located in

Winston-Salem, NC and Los Angeles, CA.

This year marks the 60th anniversary of the VA home-loan program, which was created in 1944 Serviceman's Readjustment Act. VA has made 17.7 million loans to veterans.

To research your family's eligibility, visit the VA website at www.homeloans.va.gov. This may be the best decision you make this year.



Noble Eagle, Operation Enduring Freedom and Operation Iraqi Freedom contingencies. And a fifth Weather Flight member deployed to Spain to provide forecasting support for Army and Air assets and missions supporting Operation Enduring Freedom.

On the training front, the unit participated in four, weapons-of-mass-destruction exercises at military locations within the Commonwealth with the 34th Civil Support Team. The flight took part in a two-week Warfighter command and control exercise at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas, and it deployed with and handled all forecasting requirements for the aviation brigade of the Army's 29th Infantry Division during the division's annual field training at Ft. A.P. Hill. Additionally, unit members were among the first to complete a new field training program emphasizing tactical, communication and technical skills.

Senior weather flight staff taught three, separate Air National Guard Weather Flight Management seminars at the Air Force Weather Leadership Symposium; and Weather Superintendent, SMSgt Stephen R. Gamache, performed as the National Guard Bureau's acting Career

Field Manager. Meanwhile Colonel Wallace single-handedly staffed the U.S. Army's Southern Command Weather Operation at Ft. Sam Houston, Texas, from Aug. through Oct. 2003. He purchased \$1 million worth of weather sensoring equipment for placement in Columbia, worked hurricane forecasts, and conducted his first weather forecasts for the Southern Hemisphere.

The commander recently returned from a 116-day tour at Al Udeid AB, Qatar, as the Staff Weather Officer for the 484th Aerospace Expeditionary Group in support of Operation Iraqi

Freedom, Security and Stabilization Operations. He was in charge of all weather personnel – more than 200 Airmen spread over numerous locations - and their equipment everything from handheld devices to radar – as well as the logistics and supplies needed to maintain both the people and the equipment.

Two individuals provided up-to-the-minute weather forecasts at the Virginia NG emergency operations center at Fort Pickett during Hurricane Isabel last September. And most recently, WF members developed a means to provide real-time Automated Network Weather Sensor readouts that allow 192d Fighter Wing Operations personnel to get updated weather observations every 90 seconds.

The 200th Weather Flight is a tenant unit at Richmond International Airport that provides tailored weather observing and forecasting support to the Army's 29th Infantry Division (Light).

They work in and report on some of the most extreme weather conditions on earth. They've provided weather forecasting services for ground and air military training exercises as far north as upper New York during winter – in 50-degree-below-zero temperatures with heavy lakeeffect snow. They've given weather advisories for ground troops in the deserts of Kuwait with temperatures reaching 124°, no shade and blinding sandstorms driven by 30-40 knot winds. They've provided their services for military forces maneuvering in heavy forests with limited visibility,

> high humidity and dense fog. Sometimes they work in for headquarters commanders in state-of-the-art facilities, other times they set up shop with their transportable equipment, and other times they are completely mobile and radioing their forecasts to field commanders who are actively engaged in tactical

maneuvers.

Protecting equipment from the desert sand was a continuing challenge for the weather forecasters. TSgt. Lowell Ivy, 200th Weather Flight, prepares a forecast with plastic sheeting protecting his computer at their tactical

operations center in Kuwait.

They conduct field training regularly – moving around between Ft. A.P. Hill, Ft. Pickett, and the State Military Reservation to keep things new. The unit sets up incredibly fast - from the time the truck stops to being operational happens in a matter of minutes, and the team is always

working to hone those skills.

This period of tremendous effort was recognized by senior VaANG leadership during the May drill when several unit members received official AF recognition, including MSgt. Lori W. Flinn, Weather System Manager, who earned the Bronze Star for her work while in Iraq.



It's Time For Unit Climate Assessments!

The purpose of the UCA is to assist commanders at all levels in determining their human relations climate. The program identifies those human relations factors, both positive and negative, that may affect mission readiness, such as unit morale, equal opportunity and treatment, interpersonal relationships and communications. Below are samples of questions and statistics (90% accuracy) from the Air National Guard EO Climate Assessment dated April – September 2003.

Job environment: I like my job. 91.6% favorable, 4.0% neutral, 4.4% unfavorable.

Motivation/Pride/Recognition: I am recognized for doing a good job. 75% favorable, 10.4% neutral, 14.5% unfavorable.

Peer Relationships: Coworkers do their fair share of the work. 77.8% favorable, 8.7% neutral, 13.5% unfavorable. **Unit Leadership**: There is open communication between my supervisor and me. 87.1% favorable, 4.2% neutral, 8.7% unfavorable.

Perception of Freedom to Address Concerns: I believe I can use my chain of command to address concerns about discrimination and/or sexual harassment without fear of reprisal or retaliation. 79.8% favorable, 9.9% neutral, 10.2% unfavorable.

Fair Treatment/Discrimination/Sexual Harassment: Discrimination based on race does not occur in my work area. 83.9% favorable, 8.2% neutral, 7.9% unfavorable.

This year, the survey will be taken on the computer. Participation is strictly voluntary, and there is nothing identifiable on the survey. Each squadron will receive a specified amount of time to complete the survey on line. It is imperative to access the survey within the time limit and members may complete their surveys from any computer (home or work).
