# Why We Focus on the Family by Ch(Maj) Ed Moran

In our focus on accomplishing the mission, it's easy to forget the critical contexts in which the mission gets done. Chief among these is the family. Behavioral scientists can tell a lot about us by looking at our family of origin. We become something of the parents from whom we come. Furthermore, if we disrupt the family, it's only a short matter of time until the service member and the mission are disrupted. The context of family is that critical. It's a fiction to think that we can live in a selfcontained 'compartment' doing our work unaffected if our family is suffering. This is why while on deployment, commanders and senior NCO's are particularly attentive to what's happening back home for their team members. If we deal with the disruption at the family level, the service member's focus normally stays intact.

May is the month we focus on the family and the role it plays in the Air Guard. Whether we are single or have children arranged like so many 'stepping stones', family is important! The quality of family life effects directly the quality of accomplishing the Air force mission. This is one critical reason why the Air Force invests so extensively in Family Support Programs and trains chaplains to deal with a myriad of family issues ranging from domestic violence and communication to deployment separation and teen adjustment.

A critical element often left out of considering the life of the family is the role of faith and prayer. This is because we live in a secular environment where such elements are more often than not left out. The result is that we grow up without considering the role a spiritual

reference makes in our personal and family development. On a practical level, it is so very true that a family that prays together, stays together. Why? I think it's because that with prayer, there is a reference to Someone greater than the self. Too often we dismiss our actions as they relate only to ourselves. A mark of development occurs when we start thinking of them as they relate to another. Better yet, is when we think of them as they relate to God. This is the basis not only of a sound moral ethic but also

the basis for true personal development. Strong marriages based on true consideration and sacrifice for another make for strong families. Prayer to address the personal needs and weaknesses, the strength to forgive as we are forgiven, the celebration of gifts and joys received and shared all lead to the kind of cohesiveness in a family that can embrace and overcome its shares of sorrows and trials. The military life of the family today has many more sorrows and trials than civilian life because of the presence of deployment and the difficult tempo of operations.

Take a moment this month to consider and give thanks for our family. It has made us the people we are. If you have children, your example is making them who they will be. Ask yourself if you are equipped spiritually to deal with the dysfunctions of the past and the trials of the present? If not, come in and speak to one of the chaplains. We are here to serve and to be a spiritual resource for you and your family. Yes, the quality of our family life will determine whether we accomplish the mission or not. That's why it's good to use this month of May to think about the quality of our family life and what we can do by way of prayer and counsel to improve it.

Shoppers will be able to purchase soft drinks, water condiment items, paper products and snack items.

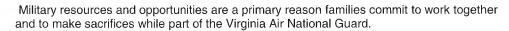
All items will be available in bulk and in great individual quantity purchases.

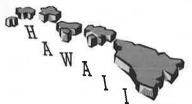

Talking with family, friends and co-workers is something we do on a daily basis. As we converse, we speak on topics like politics, religion and our employment. Sensitive discussions about the work place, in the work place, can sometimes have adverse consequences. These discussions can lead to gossip, which is the "habitual revelation of personal facts," these facts may be true or may be a rumor, which is "talk that is widely spread with no discernible source."

Consequences in the work place can be lack of trust, anger, hurt, and resentment. Whether it's between supervisor and subordinate, subordinate and subordinate, a section and subordinate, emotions such as the ones listed above will not be conducive to a positive working environment.

Another consequence that may occur is the lost of confidentiality. Private information should remain just that,

private. When negative and private information about your employment is shared, it creates an environment that can be destructive. Sometimes, a person may share only part of the story. Those who receive or overhear the part may fabricate its contents. Others may begin to speculate on them. Of course, everyone has the right to speak freely about their own affairs, but it is now being asked that you begin to use discretion. By doing so, you will help decrease the amount of gossip and rumors that float around the base.

We know sharing will continue. We just hope that this article encourages you to keep matters that are private, private. Offices on this base that must maintain confidentiality will continue to do so. It is now your duty to help maintain privacy when you are discussing sensitive issues pertaining to work.

## The Future Arrives: The Merging of 'Cultures'

While many think of Total Force when it comes only to deployments and joint exercises, something much closer to home is taking place. A precedent-setting integration between the 192d Fighter Wing, Sandston and the 1st Fighter Wing, Langley Air Force Base has been set into motion by the recently signed Concept of Operation (CONOPS) that takes the latest tactical fighter in the Air Force's inventory the F/A-22 Raptor and teams it up with Active Duty and Air Guard service members. Lt. Col Barker, who is the 192d's liaison at Langley in charge of the new stand-up unit Det 3, spoke of the humble origins of this revolutionary move from two concurrent needs. "On one side is the diminishing numbers of Active Duty specialties in a demanding OPS tempo that are truly needed to keep the force strong and able to meet the new challenges of force projection to engage global terrorism. On the Guard side is a profile of an exceptional unit of cohesive and seasoned professionals dealing with an aging fleet of F-16s that needs to take advantage of the

technological advances to stay in the fight. Operationally integrating both units to take advantage of the best in technology and personnel is the goal of this forward-thinking merger." He noted that the work being done at present is the drafting of documents that outline the manpower needs. "What these documents mean for the 192d's transition to Langley," Barker said, "would be more of a 'reshuffle' not a 'reduction' as we identify what the Active Duty and Air Guard will supply in the merger to achieve 'Zero Losses'."

When queried about the challenges such a move will entail, Barker was quite specific. He noted that both sides will have to learn more about the ways each does business:

Each side has very well defined 'cultures' that guide operations; when mobilized, the Guard works from Title 10. Under normal day-to-day operations, Title 32 laws prevail; there is a mix of fulltime and traditional service members interacting with Active Duty personnel; maintaining unit cohesiveness in the midst of integrated work schedules; Security clearance updates for working around the latest technology. These are just a few of the challenges we will have to work out, Barker noted. Right now, he said, we are in the midst of preparing an Environmental Assessment that will lead to the funding for the initial arrival of the Air Guard personnel.

Lt. Col Philip Guy, the first Air Guard pilot from the 192d chosen to go to Tyndall Air Force Base for training in the Raptor had more insights on the upcoming Integration. "The Virginia Air Guard has always been able to meet the challenge of taking the fight to America's enemies," he noted. "What integration does is to beef up the maintenance and operation components to increase combat capability to help reduce some of the

OPS tempo that's straining the lives of Air Force service members." As a 2700 hour veteran of the F-16, he said that the F/A-22 was a huge step up in systems and performance. "Think of computers back in 1986, then think of computers today and you will get a sense of what the F/A-22 brings to the

fight". The three month training at Tyndall will cover systems, emergency procedures and tactics specific to the Raptor's capabilities and comes after Guy spent 25 hours in the newest of

> the Air Force's flight simulators at Langley doing ten flights. "It's always been his dream of flying the F/A-22", Denise Guy told us in a phone interview. "We are an 18-year Air Force family proud of what we contribute to the worth it for the training he's getting and way it

nation. While it's hard with him being gone, it's will allow the Air Guard to step up and meet the latest Air Force mission."

A crucial part of the Integration is the role Air Guard maintenance personnel will play in learning the Raptor's systems and working alongside their Active Duty counterpart. TSgt Scott Browning and TSgt David Dehart were chosen to begin training on the new systems. Browning spoke of his

initial impressions of work at Langley as warm and friendly. "There's a lot of curiosity on both sides as to how the interface will go," he noted. "Keeping an open mind and remembering that we are here for the same mission will help as we work with the

differences between Active Duty and Air Guard." Dehart noted that the Air Guard "brings a great foundation to the new challenges. We in the Air Guard have a great tradition of excellence and something from which to build." Browning spelled out succinctly the benefits of merger between to the Air Guard from the Integration: "We'll be ready, reliable and relevant to the Air Force's mission."
