Advocate the Air National Guard

It's been an interesting time for history. Last month the National Guard had its 370th birthday and this September the Air Force, and 192nd, turn 60. It was another quiet day in history as we completed our first Unit Training Assembly (UTA) weekend "drill" at Langley AFB, Jan 07. Just over 100 192 FW folks worked Saturday accomplishing combat training tasks at the Distributed Ground Station (Intel imagery analysis), base support functions and F-22A missions. Sunday was ancillary training. Here's a great recap: "...during the production meeting Monday morning, the Pro Super who worked Saturday praised us for all the help we offered. He went on to state that our help in getting aircraft 047 ready for Monday's flying kept his crew from having to come in (at all) on Sunday. I told him that there was much more to come... as more of our crew chiefs get spun up. We accomplished a lot of training, and managed to help produce flyable aircraft for the unit, (27th and 192nd... the "TEAM"), and made the mandatory annual PT at the base gym a fun event." It was great seeing a sea of 192 FW ball caps around the base, unit identity - I was

reading Ms. Grant's "The Billy Mitchell syndrome" from the latest Air Force Magazine and I want to repeat some of it as it relates to our identity and telling the ANG story.

Airpower advocacy is part of being an airman. Air Force Doctrine Document 2 tells all USAF members, Each of you must be articulate, knowledgeable, and unapologetic advocates." It adds, "We must understand what it means to be an airman" and explain "what air and space power can bring to the joint fight." Advocacy has a checkered history in the Air Force and its predecessor organizations. Start with Brig: Gen. William Mitchell in the 1920s, and you see that speaking up for airpower carried risks. Richard P. Hallion, former Air Force chief historian, has written that one result, among senior airmen, is a "tendency to not be as aggressive in arguing" the airpower case as one would expect them to be." Call it the Billy Mitchell Syndrome..." "In 1998, Air Force Maj." Gen. Charles D. Link summed up the problem for USAF leaders. "When a soldier talks about using airpower to support troops on the ground, he's applauded for his 'jointness,'" said Link. "When a sailor talks about using Air Force tankers to extend the range of naval aircraft, he's lauded for his 'jointness.' But when an airman talks about using airpower independently to kill the enemy instead of putting our troops in harm's way in the first place, he's being parochial and 'unjoint,' which is now viewed as a sin on the order of adultery."

We all need to advocate the Air Force story. In next month's corner, I'll write how if you replace 'advocating airpower' with 'advocating the ANG' how this relates to us and unit identity. Please search out the AF Magazine article – it's good!

Line of Duty Injuries and Illnesses

Notify your supervisor Notify the 192d clinic when initially injured and keep them informed of all medical care you are receiving, be sure to turn in all medical documentation to the clinic

For continuation care, know your options -your health insurance or the military medical system, and make a choice

If referred to a civilian provider. be aware of the possibility of longer waits, longer travel distances, billing glitches or misunderstanding of your authorization to care

Be sure the civilian provider participates in Tricare Prime

Always hand-carry a copy of your **LOD** paperwork to MTF or civilian appointments

Contact the 192d clinic for questions concerning medical care or billing

Contact the 192d finance office for questions concerning pay issues or loss wages

Contact the 192d personnel office for the status of your LOD paperwork

Contact the 192d legal office for USERRA issues or legal matters

Cut out the box below to keep the key LOD points of contact handy incase you need them.



The graduation ceremony was held at the Langley AFB Officers Club. Col Jay Pearsall and a very enthusiastic group of members of the 192d were in attendance to personally congratulate SrA Broocks on his hard work and dedication to this invaluable course. SrA Broocks is an F22 crew chief assigned to the 192FW Det 3, Langley AFB.

The 5 week course curriculum includes three areas of study; Profession of Arms, Leadership and Communication Skills. It prepares senior airmen to accept greater responsibilities as future supervisors and managers while placing great emphasis on student involvement in the classroom.

Eligibility criteria for selection to attend Airman Leadership School include the following:

- 1. Hold the rank of Senior Airman.
- 2. Have:
 - a. 48 months time-in-service (TIS) prior to class start date. .. or ..
- b. 42 months time in service (TIS) AND hold a δ-skill level in their primary air force specialty code, or a 3-skill level for those AFSCs that do not have a δ-skill level (e.g., weather, etc).
- a 5-skill level (e.g., weather, etc).

 Be recommended by a supervisor and squadron commander.

Important Immunization Information

With the New Year comes a new list of immunizations Airmen need to be fit for the fight. You will also see a few new faces when you visit the Immunization Clinic.

You will be receiving a new Tetanus shot

when vaccination time is due. The Tdap replaces the Td (Tetanus-Diphtheria) and is a combination of Tetanus, Diphtheria and Pertussis (Whooping Cough). Here is a link to the Centers for Disease Control fact sheet for additional information: http://www.cdc.gov/nip/publications/VIS/vis-tdap.pdf

Another new Air Force required immunization is the Varicella vaccine, for prevention of Chickenpox and is mandatory for all Airmen born after 1980.

If you were born <u>before 1980</u>, we will update your exemption status. Be patient as it may take some time for medical personnel to update everyone's records.

For members born <u>after 1980</u> without previous serologic evidence of immunity, you will be titer tested (blood drawn). If you can show proof of immunization or a blood test, provide a copy of the paperwork from your doctor to release you from receiving a titer/and or vaccine.

Airmen can help speed the process for adding these new medical requirements by researching personal files for necessary blood test results and immunization records. If you do not have proof, medical professionals will draw a titer and, if necessary, administer the Varicella vaccine for prevention of Chickenpox.

Females who have ever been pregnant have had a titer drawn from your doctor. Call to get a copy of the results.

College students have also more than likely had a titer drawn for the admission process. Contact the school and obtain a copy.

And, note that the operating hours for the Saturday Immunization Clinic are now 0930 to 1130 and 1300-1600.

The Immunization clinic will be minimally manned during the following UTA's due to mandatory training requirements for most of the medical group: Feb, May, Jun, Aug & Sep. Please keep in mind the line may be longer due to this situation.
